ROURKES WIN WITH STICK

Heavy Hitting in Sixth and Seventh Puts Them Ahead.

FOUND EHMANN INTO GROUND

Antelope Twister Gets Hardest Drubbing So Far This Season, While Hicks Yields to Applegate.

LINCOLN, May 8.—(Special Telegram.)—Heavy hitting in the sixth and seventh innings enabled Omaha to come up from behind and take the second game of the series from the Lopes, 5 to 4.

The bombardment started in the sixth which, coupled with errors by Lincoln, allowed Omaha to score four runs and the Rourkes clinched it by adding two more in the seventh.

Harry Hicks pitched a nice game up until the seventh, when Lincoln drove him from the mound, after two runs had been forced over the plate. Applegate, who succeeded him, had the Antelope helpless, retiring two batters with two men on bases and did not allow Lincoln to get within sight of the plate after that.

Lincoln scored in the first on hits by Lloyd and Cole and added another in the third on hits by Cole and Bachor.

In the seventh the Lopes looked dangerous with four hits in succession, netting two runs, but Applegate retired the next two batters.

Omaha Scores in Sixth. Omaha did not score until the sixth. In the second Johnson and Grubb both singled, but sharp fielding did not allow them to get past second. In the sixth Coyle opened with a single, Thomson attempted to sacrifice, but Ehmman swung the ball and Coyle and Thomson were both safe. Kane followed with a single and hits to bases were choked. Ehmman forced the first run by hitting Congalton.

Johnson singled, scoring Thomson and Kane. Schipke sacrificed and Grubb reached first safely on an infield grounder. Johnson scored while McCormick and Collins were trying to tag Grubb off first base. Hicks flew out for the final out.

With two out in the seventh Thomson singled to center, Kane singled and Congalton followed with the third hit, but the runners were held to the bases. Then Johnson followed with a long drive which Coyle was barely able to reach with his finger tips. Two runs came in when Cole dropped the ball. Congalton was caught at the plate on an attempted double steal.

That ended the scoring for Omaha, although Coyle singled sharply to right with one down in the ninth. The next two men were easy outs.
