on Grain List.

CORN HOLDERS ARE CAUTIOUS

Reports from Interior that There Was an Increase in Offerings Brings On a Conservative Disposition.

OMAHA, May 15, 1913.

It was popular to put out short lines of wheat yesterday and the matter of price was a secondary consideration. Those who believe wheat will sell to a lower level attacked values yesterday and there was heavy selling also from weary and discouraged holders. The entire grain list was lower, with wheat the weakest spot. Crop prospects were improved in both the spring and winter wheat areas by the heavy rains where most needed. When it was seen there were only twenty-five boatloads of wheat taken at Baitimore for export on the declines established yesterday the average long made up his mind that conditions were against him and he took to his heels and rapidly changed his base from buil to the bear side. On the decline there were many stop-loss orders uncovered and for a time the pit was chock full of wheat with the buying power smaller than any day during the week. Those who are known in the crades professionals bought early because of some additional war talk, and they sold out later on the general selling movement and at losses. The talent in wheat was chopped to "mincemeat" for the third time during the present week, suffering heavy losses.

A message attracting most attention yesterday was received from Texas via St. Louis in which bids were asked for new wheat for the first half of July loading. The message said that the foreigners were "invited" to make bids on the wheat for the same delivery as specified here, but that there were no answers from abroad. Cash wheat was he lower.



While selling appeared to be largely for the short account there were signs of liquidation in various quarters and some severe losses. The fertilizer group was heavy.
