GRAIN AND PRODUCE MARKET

Advance in Wheat Market Considered to Be Too Pronounced.

WHEAT AFFECTS CORN AND OATS Easter Tone Prevailed Until Price

of Small Grain Started to Make Quick Advances-Closing Prices on Exchange.

Comparatively speaking the advances of 184714c in the Chicago market yesterday was too pronounced under present conditions. Up to the present the crop reports received from nearly every section of the southwest have been overwhelmingly bearish. In fact, the prospects for a big crop of winter grain were never surpassed by the present outlook. To make the sharp advance of yesterday more questionable, it may be stated that the reports of deterioration in sections of the great winter wheat best were conflicting in character, which made the claim of losses doubtful. A Chicago crop expert, now in the southwest, reported counties in Kansass as showing a reduction in prospects as compared with a few weeks ago and as some of these reports were accompanied by buying orders they caused a general str in the big wheat pit on the Board of Trade.

The market showed signs of broadening and the outsider was on the buying side. In addition to general covering by shorts, with two concerns purchasing at least 1,00,000 bushels of July and September wheat, there were many professionals to cover and their buying together with the demand from the larger people caused quite a big stir in market circles at Chicago and elsewhere. It was generally believed that at the close buying had been overdone and many weak-kneed speculators will come on the board soon with a good-sized line of wheat and they will watch for an opportunity to sell out at a profit. In case the buying power is on in evidence and the offerings are liberal a "selling bee" of considerable importance will doubtless be witnessed. Cash wheat le higher.

An easier tone prevailed in both the corn and oats markets during the early part of yesterday, but when wheat showed that there was considerable steam behind it the buying of both corn and oats became pronounced (not only on short account), but there was a goodly sprinkling of investors to take hold. 
