

Record for Course NEW YORK, May 23.-The golfers who

survived the opening rounds for the Metropolitan Amateur Golf championship started off today over the rain-souked links of the Pox Hills Golf club, Staten Island. The weather overhead was threatening, but no rain fell after the early morning hours.

The most prominent players in the leading division are Jerome D. Travers the national champion, and Oswald Kirkby, the New Jersey state champion. Both were in the lower half, so that if they win their early matches today they will be pitted against each other in the semi-finals.

Travers has won the Metropolitan champlonship four times and has held the title for the last two years. Judging from his playing since this tournament began, it looked as though he would be returned the winner for the fifth time Travers' defeated Beach, Fox Hills, in the third round, 7 up and 5 to play. The champion was invincible, playing remark-ably clever golf all the way. He went out in thirty-three and when the match was won on the thirteenth hole, he decided to play out the bye holes for a record. He came in in thirty-seven, mick ing a total of seventy, a new emateur record for the course.
