

Judge Wheeler set the time for hearing the application at June 14 requiring ten days' notice to be given by the plaintiffs.

Permitted by Council. In the process of reconstructing the Ciark building, which called for the expenditure of several thousand dollars, Mr. Clark secured permission from the city council to do what many others had been doing after similar permission had been granted-extending reconstructed fronts of business houses several inches into the street. Precedent was set several years and for the last year or two every new front that has been placed in the old buildings has been extended, encroaching from a few inches to a foot or more upon the sidewalk. In each case the council has let it be clearly understood that such encroachment could not be constructed into permanent occupancy of the occulted portion of the sidewalk, and that the expensive improvements might be demolished whenever citizens chose to demand it.

Early in the spring the Commercial club and the Real Estate exchange submitted appeals to the council to cease the practice, but owing to the fact that the bad precedent had been established It was too late to begin dentals. All requests that have since been granted have been hedged about with specific declarations that the owners of the property were assuming all responsibility and risk of trouble. This was the case when permission was given to extend the show windows of the Clark building and a special contract was made, by which the owner assumed the costs and responsibility of defending any suits that might be instituted. Case Complained of.

The projection on the west side of the Clark building extends eighteen inches upon the sidewalk at the corner of Broadway and Main street, and practically three feet when it reaches the south end of the building, more than 100 feet distant. It reduces the width of the sidewalk to less than eight feet.

The machine is called the trochoscope, meaning not only to enter, but to see. The new instrument was exhibited last night and an impromptu clinic provided that proved to be of fascinating interest to a number who were invited to be present. The machine was demonstrated last night by the physician in charge, who was most enthusiastic in its praise and declared it to be one of the greatest aids that science has given the profession for alteriating physical pain and saving human life.
