

ROURKES TAKE BOTH ENDS

Rogge Loses First Game This Year—Had Won Eleven.

CREDIT ROBINSON WITH TWO

Battling Rallies in Eighth and Ninth Innings of the First Game Give Victory to the Rourkes

Battling rallies in the eighth and ninth innings gave Omaha the first game yesterday by a 5 to 4 score and Robinson buried airtight ball in the second battle, which was also confounded by the Rourkes, 6 to 1.

Clint Rogge, who entered the first game with a string of eleven consecutive wins, lost his first game of the season. Omaha sluggers found him for a total of fourteen hits.

Robinson gets credit for winning both of the games. He went on the mound in the ninth inning of the first battle with a 4 to 3 score starting him in the face, with Omaha holding the short end, and came out winner. He worked all through the second game, with excellent control and all kinds of stuff. But five hits were gathered off his delivery and he allowed but one free passage.

The Fatal Ninth.

It was a hard row to hoe that Rogge had when he faced the Omaha batters in the ninth inning. Thompson was the first man up and following him came four other 300 sluggers. As several fans remarked in the stands, if Rogge could get by that bunch he was welcome to the name. But he didn't get by that bunch, for Thompson slammed the first one on an error by Leonard. Congalton somewhat disappointed the crowd by striking out, but Hickory Johnson came across with a hard one over third base and Thompson

retreated from second. Leonard taking the bag he vacated. Grubb made his fourth consecutive hit by beating out a bunt, choking the bags. Here it was that Schipke won the game with a smash to center field and Kane slipped under the winning tally. Schipke's hit was good for at least two bags, but under the existing conditions only counted as a single.

Justice is Brilliant.

Justice played two brilliant games, and to him must go a great deal of credit. In the first game he handled ten chances without a boot. In the eighth inning he made one of the prettiest plays to get a runner at the plate which has been pulled off in many a day. Hunter was on third and Leonard on first, when an attempted double steal was started. Johnson whipped the ball to Schipke and Hunter took a lead off third. Schipke, Justice and Kane tried with Leonard between first and second until Hunter made a dash for the plate. Here it was that Justice shot the ball knee high into Johnson's waiting mitt and Hunter slid into it.

In the second game Justice handled ten more chances, but made one error, in all handling twenty chances with but one boot, and this was the easiest one of the day and he evidently was too sure of it. In the second game he lobbed out three hits in four times at bat.

"Tex" Has Bad Day.

"Tex" Jones had an off game in the first one, being credited with three errors, all of which were palpable muffs. He did not make a hit in eight times he batted in the two games.

The second game was a walk-away for the Rourkes. Thompson was safe when he forced Neff off second. Kane singled, Tommie acted as third, Leonard between second and third, men were on Congalton's line drive to the right pasture.

Des Moines made one in the fifth, when Heighlight doubled to left and scored on Hahn's single.
