Attorney General Disapproves Rail Dissolution Plans

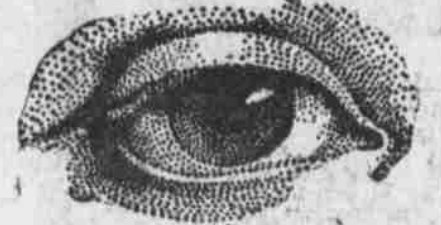

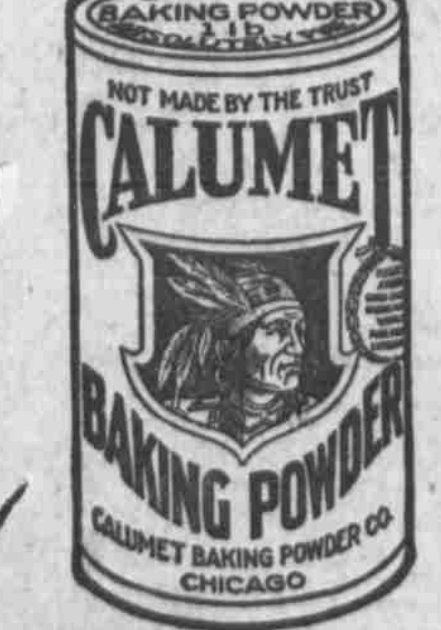
