W. D. Starbird Loses His Action Against the McShanes.

DOUGLAS CASE IS REVERSED

Supreme Court Rules Where no Exclusive Contract for Agency, Recovery Cannot Be Had if Third Party Makes Deal.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Neb., June 16.-(Special)-The case of W. D. Starbird against J. H. McShane Timber company, in which Starbird secured a judgment against Mc-Shane for \$18,798 in the Douglas county district court, was reversed and remanded in supreme court today.

It was set out that the lumber company owned property in the Big Horn mountains costing \$400,000; that the capital stock of the company was \$250,000, all held by J. H. McShane and F. J. Mc The business was involved in debt and would have to be sold, and Mr. McShane requested Starbird to sell the property and promised he would receive ore money than he ever had." Later an agreement was made to give Starbird \$25,600. Afterward the property was sold for \$182,850 and plaintiff demanded his ion of \$25,000, which was re-
