At No Time During the Day the Supply Excessive and September Option is the Favorite Month.

OMAHA June 19, 1913.

The new crop whear a new using offered in increased quantities with purchases of 10,000 bushels of Illinois grown grain at "call bids" for shipment by July 20. The cutting of wheat is well under way in southeastern Missouri and according to advices received here yesterday it will be shipped earlier than usual as farmers are willing to sell quite freely at present prices. The first car of new wheat from that section of the southwest was received at St. Louis yesterday. It graded No. 2 red and sold at 20% to a miller. Samples of new wheat were shown on the Board of Trade yesterday from Missouri that weighed 59 pounds to the bushel.

from Missouri that weighed 59 pounds to the bushel.

When the fact is considered that the primary movement of wheat continues abnormally large for the month of June, being 593,000 bushels westerday, compared with 249,000 bushels a year ago, it shows that enormous receipts must be taken care of with the movement of the new crop in full awing. Speculators are now in control of the wheat market, but later the merchant will hold the whip hand.

John C. Schultz, one of the larger handlers of cash wheat in the southwest with headquarters at Kansas City, was on the exchangs yesterday. He said Kansas would have anywhere from 40,000,000 to 60,000,000 bushels of wheat Cash wheat was 45% lower.

The southwest was in the corn market on the buying side in a liberal manner yesterday, with September the favorite month. Chicago shorts covered freely and at no time was the supply excessive. The "cotton crowd," which has given the July option a great deal of attention, is pretty well out of that month and may now be seen in the September as the principal holders. There were 600,000 bushels more corn received yesterday at primary markets than for the corresponding day last year. Cash corn was unchanged to ½c lower.
