

OMAHA LOSES TO LINCOLN

Home Team is Defeated by Score of Six to Two in a Good Game.

LOCALS LEAD FOR SEVEN INNINGS

McCormick for the Visitors Does Some Work that Resulted in a Victory for the Antelopes.

"Big Bill" McCormick, the Antelopes' left fielder, broke up yesterday's game in the eighth inning when, with two men on, he slammed out a triple and came back in the ninth with a single which scored two runs, forcing the Rourkes to take the short end of a 6 to 4 score.

It was Omaha's game all the way to the eighth, with Peters going like a "house afire." He had given but three hits and it looked like sure bacon for the home boys, but Peters soared in this fatal frame and when every bit of dust had blown away from the score board the Antelopes had hung up four runs, one more than the Rourkes had been able to collect.

"Bunk" Congalton, by hammering the ball over the fence in the eighth, dead-ended the score, but in the ninth two men got on bases and "Big Bill" did the deed which gave the visitors their only game of the series.

Errors are few. It was one of the fastest games of the season, both teams playing light-edged ball, marred occasionally by poor work on the part of Empire Cloffower, but not so bad that it beat Omaha out of the game.

Lincoln did not hang up a boot, while the Rourkes made but one error. Peters' work in the box could not be beaten until the eighth. His fielding was the sensation of the day, and it was with deep regret that the fans saw him ascend. In the second inning he pitched Loyal's liner out of the air by almost turning himself inside out. And had it not been for this trick two Lincoln players would have romped over the rubber. In the next inning he made a wonderful stop of McCormick's hot grounder and threw the ball below out at first while Mullen was hanging about the keystone sack aching to beat it home.

Omaha started after the game early, hanging up two runs in the opening inning. Thomson opened by getting to first on an infield hit. Justice followed with an up and a sacrifice. Kane popped out to Barbour and Johnson walked. Tommie and Johnson walked later on Nuff's single to left.

In the eighth, with one out, Congalton put the ball over the right field fence in the eighth.

Lead of One Run. Lloyd opened the eighth for Lincoln with an infield hit. Mullen walked. Collins forced Mullen at second and Lloyd went to the corner. McCormick tripled to center, scoring Lloyd and Collins. Barbour singled and Mac registered. A double by Dowling sent Barbour over the rubber, giving the "Lopes a one-run lead.

With the score 4 to 1 in the ninth, Lloyd beat out a bunt. Mullen singled and Lloyd went to the corner. Peters went to the game and walked, filling the bases. McCormick singled and Lloyd and Mullen tallied. Score: OMAHA, 4; LINCOLN, 1.

GIANTS EASY FOR PIRATES

Pittsburghs Hit Three Pitchers at the Right Time.

NEW YORK'S FIELDING LOOSE

Terrorer Seems to Suffer from the Intense Heat and is Found Stendly for Four Innings.

PITTSBURGH, June 20.—Pittsburgh hit three New York pitchers at the right time and the loose fielding of the visitors enabled them to win easily, 7 to 2. O'Toole pitched splendid ball and errors behind him figured in the scoring of all three of New York's runs. It was a scrappy battle, with Umpire Hank O'Day between two fires. Meyers kicked so hard on balls and strikes in the fifth that O'Day ordered him out of the game. Wood and Coleman, two Pittsburgh recruits who are filling in for crippled absentees, started with the bat. Each scored two runs and had three hits. Terrorer seemed to suffer from the intense heat and was hit steadily for four innings.

YALE MEN WEEP AS CRIMSON RUNS AWAY

Real Race Between Freshmen. The struggle for honors between the first year crews, however, was a real race. Although the Crimson won, the showing of the Eli youngsters was excellent. Both eights caught the water at the bridge at 10:32 and raced up the river toward the mile mark at thirty-eight strokes to the minute. In the opening dash Harvard showed a little more finish and drive in its stroke and gradually moved into the lead until at the first half mile mark the Cambridge crew led by half a length, rowing thirty-eight strokes to the minute, against Yale's thirty-two.

Passing through the long line of yachts to the mile mark, both eights rowed steadily. Harvard dropped to a thirty-six stroke mark, but had increased their advantage to a full length at the mile.

Here the Blue youngsters started a spurt that set the Yale clan shouting. Jumping their strokes to thirty-six and then to thirty-eight, they gradually out-threw the Crimson lead to a scant half length at the mile and a half mark. Still rowing smoothly, the New Haven combination worked the stroke up to forty, and it began to appear as though the Yale men would nip their rivals before the finish was reached.

Harvard increases stroke. Harvard's freshmen had power in reserve, however, and also increased its stroke until both crews were racing at a forty-stroke clip. A quarter of a mile from the finish the pace proved too much for the Elis, who, despite the high stroke, drifted back until a scant length separated the two shells as they passed between the finish flags. Both crews finished the hard race without signs of excessive physical exhaustion and held perfect stroke form until the end. So far as could be judged from the average spectator's point of view, there was very little difference between the so-called Wray stroke and the English stroke rowed by the Yale freshmen. The Yale crew used the English method of seating and thole pin oarlocks in place of the swivel outrigger of the Harvard shell. There was nothing to indicate an advantage one way or the other in the differing forms of shell rigging and the crews appeared to win and lose on physical form and rowing technique, as in past years.

The closeness of the race was shown by the fact that but four seconds separated winner and loser. Harvard finished the two miles in 10:41, as against Yale's time of 10:48.
