

elective body. Original Proposition Reinserted. Reinserted in the bill was the original proposition for retiring the present bank notes within twenty years and the substitution of additional federal reserve notes for them. This eliminates the proposed limit of \$500,000,000 in reserve notes contained in the bill as originally made public. In replacing the bank notes the government 2 per cent bonds, upon which they now are issued would be refunded by 5 per cent bonds without the circulation privilege.

Chairman Glass made preparations for the speedy consideration of the bill by the house committee. He secured the passage through the house of two resolutions to facilitate the work. One provided for printing and distributing 25,000 copies of the new bill. The other provided \$50,000 for the payment of experts to be employed by the committee.
