But Johnson Says American League Flag Not Yet Annexed.

NOTHING CERTAIN IN BASE BALL

Executive Says He Has Faith in Chance and that Great New York Club Being Built Up for Next Year.

NEW YORK, July 18.-Although neither the American or National league perinant is the property of any particular club as yet. Ban Johnson and the other members of the National commission are beginning to plan for the world's series of 1913. The American league executive while here said:

"While the Athletics have a big lead at present nothing is certain in base ball. I notice that Mack still is seeking pitchers, so I guess I'm safe in saying that he is not yet ready to sit back and wait for the National league winners' onslaught. Cleveland, Washington and Chicago are all very much in the race. strengthening their teams and ready to take advantage of the slightest slip on the part of the Athletica.
