POPULARIZE PARCEL POST

Rates in First and Second Zones Are Reduced.

LIMIT WILL BE TWENTY POUNDS

Government Will Buy Automobiles to Be Used in Deliveries of the Parcels-Chart Will Displace Zone Map.

WASHINGTON, July 19.-Plans for the extension, improvement and reduction in rates of the parcel post were announced today by Postmaster Burleson. The changes, which are to become effective on August 15, include an increase from eleven pounds to twenty pounds in the maximum weight of parcels; a material reduction in the postage rates in the first and second zones and the abandonment of the parcel post map as a means of computing rates and the substitution for it of a rate chart individualized to every postoffice in the United States. The plans contemplate the purchase of a large number of automobiles to be used exclusively for the delivery of parcel post matter.

While, for the present, the maximum weight limit of twenty pounds and the reduction in rates will apply only to the first and second zones, from any given postoffice-a distance of about 150 milesthe changes directed today constitute the first long step towards a universal extension of the system and a general reduction in the rates of postage on parcel post matter.

Change in Zones and Rates. Mr. Burleson announced the changes as

"The first sone shall inclue the territory within the local delivery of any office and the first zone rate of postage will apply to all parcel post mail de-posited at any office for local delivery or for delivery by city carrier or on rural routes emanating from that post-

"The second sone shall include the remainder of what is now the first zone, together with the present second zone, and shall include all the units of area located in whole or in part within a radius of approximately 150, miles from

any given postoffice "The rate of postage on parcels weighing in excess of four ounces in the proposed first zone will be reduced from 5 cents for the first pound and 1 cent for each additional pound of fraction thereof to 5 cents for the first pound and 1 cent for each additional two pounds or fraction thereof, and the rate for the second zone will be reduced from 5 cents for the first pound and 3 cents for each additional pound or 6 cents for the first pound and 4 cents for each additional pound or fraction thereof to 5 cents for the first pound and 1 cent for each additional pound or fraction thereof

Maximum Weight Increased. "The maximum weight of parcel post packages will be increased from eleven in the size or form of the package."
