#### PENALTY LACKING IN LAW

Pool Hall Regulation in Towns is Found to Be Defective.

POINT RAISED AT HASTINGS

Operator of Hall in Unincorporated Town Advised He May Run Without License and No. One May Prevent Him.

HASTINGS, Neb., July 22 .- (Special.)-The application of Silas T. Davis to the Board of Supervisors here for a license to operate a billiard and pool hall ar Pauline, Adams county, has called attention to an apparent oversight on the parof the last legislature, which may defeat the purpose of a new law regulating such business in unincorporated towns. Pauline is an unincorporated city. Davis read the new law and guessed that he would have to apply to the county board for a license. He presented his application, but a remonstrance was subsequently filed, and as the remonstrators outnumbered the petitioners the county board refused the request.

Davis read the law again and came to the conclusion that he does not have to secure a license. The law says that he must have a license and provides that such license may be revoked if he violates any of the statutory regulations, but it contains no provision for a penalty in case of operation without a license He believes this leaves the condition the same as before the new law was passed. In the absence of a penalty he has been on a farm east of the city. advised that he may operate his place without a license and be secure from in terference by the authorities.

#### Hayden Declines to Accept Job of Special Prosecutor

WASHINGTON, July 21.-Thomas E. Hayden of San Francisco, associate counsel for the government in the Diggs-Caminetti white slave case, against whom strong protests recently were made on the ground that he was too inexperienced as a criminal lawyer to participate in the case, today tendered his resignation to Attorney General Mc-Reynolds.

Mr. Hayden asked to be relieved because he said he found he would be obliged to be absent from California a good part of the trial. The attorney general will not appoint a successor, but the case will be prosecuted by Attorneys Sullivan and Roche, the government's principal counsel.

Hayden had been considered for the San Francisco district attorneyship to succeed John McNabb, but Attorney General McReynolds today said the appointment was still wide open.
