It has been stated that one of the City's experts reported gas could be made and sold in Omaha for less than \$1.00 a thousand cubic feet.

It should not be overlooked that the estimate of this expert was based upon HIS OWN VALUA-TION OF THE PROPERTY. The courts, it appears, HAVE NOT SUSTAINED valuations of similar properties made by this expert, but have invariably GREATLY INCREASED the valuations which he reported.

The absurdity of trying to determine fair gas rates in a certain city by comparing the rates in other cities has been shown by the United States government, state utility commissions, the courts and progressive cities.

Such methods have been abandoned by genuine students of utility problems, who recognize that gas rates are based upon production costs and QUAL-ITY OF PRODUCT, and that these conditions vary widely in different parts of the country.

It is well-known, for example, that coke and oil are the materials from which gas is made in Omaha. The last report of the census on the manufacture of gas shows that, with the exception of Texas, the cost of coke for gas-making purposes was higher in Nebraska than elsewhere in the Union.
