go Corn Pit Scene of Great Market Battle.

OUTSIDERS ARE NONPLUSED With Two of the Largest Dealers Facing Each Other in Supremacy Contest Little Follows Are in a Predicament.

OMAHA, Aug. 8, 1913. One of the nearest, if not the greatest, contests ever witnessed in the corn pit on the Chicago Board of Trade is now on in earnest. The battle is in the September corn future, and arrayed on the one side are the holders of the contract, the largest speculators in the corn world has ever known. The principal shorts are being bought by Arthur H. A. A. Grain company, while the principal longs are said to be giving their orders through the Harris and Company. It is believed that these conditions mean that the Armour Grain company is on the short side of the corn personal, and that big concern is acting for an outsider, would be difficult to state with any degree of accuracy.

The wheat market, coupled with the oats, is trailing along after the corn. The wheat market is in a rut and the industry remains until corn crops black into its normal position. Cash wheat was unchanged. Cash oats were 1/2 cent higher. Clearances were 1,000 bushels of corn, 2,000 bushels of wheat and flour equal to 1,500,000 bushels of wheat and 400,000 bushels of corn.

Liverpool closed lower on wheat and 1/4 cent higher on corn. Primary receipts were 1,580,000 bushels and shipments were 680,000 bushels, against receipts last year of 1,411,000 bushels and shipments of 674,000 bushels. NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Agricultural Conditions and Mexican Situation Dominate.

INTEREST IN CROP REPORT KEEN Contrary to Expectations, Market Waiting on Statement, Shows Little Change from Preceding Somnolence.

NEW YORK, Aug. 8.—Agricultural conditions and the Mexican situation dominated today's irregular stock market. Interest in the government crop report, issued in the final market hour, was keen to the point of anarchy, the market indicating serious damage to various cereals.

Contrary to expectations the market, which had been waiting on the crop report, showed little change from its somnolence of the preceding four hours, which were relieved at odd moments by heaviness in Union Pacific, Atchafalaya, Southern Pacific, Illinois Central and Pacific Reading and Steel. Declines of the issues ran from 1 to 1/4 points, while Southern Pacific, recorded its lowest price in over a score of years.
