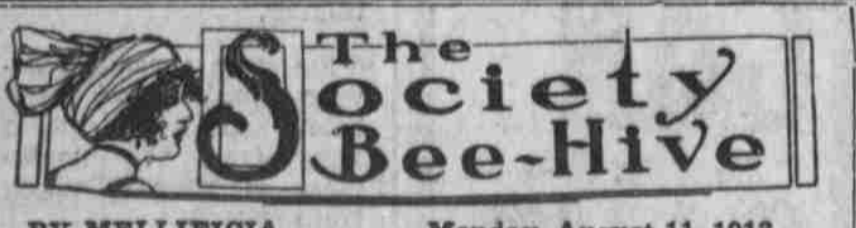

Pulmotor Saves the Life of a Tailor Who Attempts Suicide

Sam Agursky's life was saved Monday morning by the use of the pulmotor which was recently purchased by the Omaha Gas company and placed at the free disposal of the public. Agursky, who lives at 200 Spruce street and conducts the U. P. tailor shop in the McCague block, became dependent over the refusal of his girl to accept his attentions and after locking himself in his place of business turned on the gas.

Electric Light Company Inspector H. H. Thew, 506 South Fifty-second street, noticed the escaping vapor as he was making some wiring examination in the building and after tracing it to Agursky's room he and the janitor forced the door open and found the young man apparently lifeless. The police ambulance was summoned and an examination revealed a spark of life. After the pulmotor had been in use thirty minutes natural respiration was revived and Agursky was then taken to St. Joseph's hospital where he is rapidly overcoming the effects of the gas. He is 29 years of age.
