An oversold condition added stimulation and shorts covered freely. Bullish cables formed an additional lift to prices, lim-ited offers of new wheat at European centers being an interesting feature of the day's news. Expert opinion was that there has been too much rain in the porthwest, and the fear of damage from this source was one of the day's pullish influences.
