Old Omaha Landmark Standing 40 Years is Wrecked by a Fire

One of the oldest landmarks in Omaha in the way of buildings was destroyed Friday night by fire, when the barn at the rear of 1701 Capitol avenue was burned to the ground. It was erected forty years ago. The origin of the blaze is not settled, but it is thought to have been started by a lamp that had been known to sleep there. The structure burned like tinder and was a complete wreck a little while after the fire was discovered. It was valued at \$10 and was covered by insurance. Carl Carlson, who occupies the house on the lot had \$100 worth of carpenter's tools in the building.

When the Judges of the district court meet this morning they will decide whether or not a grand jury is to be summoned, according to word received in South Omaha yesterday evening. When the news got out there was considerable comment among local people who connected the rumor with the recent activity of the sheriff in South Omaha.

Whether the grand jury will be convened can not be stated, but it is safe to say that not much fear has been generated by the report of the grand jury. A year ago, when that body met, there

were some indictments and then after a long time the ones indicted were allowed to get away without even a trial.

Arraign Sixteen Negroes. Judge James Callanna and County Attorney G. A. Magney will arraign sixteen negroes this morning on a charge of vagrancy. The negroes were caught by Sheriff McShane's deputies in the notorious negro dive known as the "Coal Chutes" last Wednesday night. The place has been operating for months. The police have made a number of arrests, but the owners of the place always responded it, it is said. The beer, whiskey, wine and alleged gambling devices taken by the sheriff will be used as evidence. Harry Fleharty will defend the case. It is said. The usual defense in all circumstances has been that the place is used as a club. This was the defense used a year ago when attaches of the sheriff's office raided a saloon on Twenty-fourth street.

AFTER CARRIER CONVENTION

Nine Mail Men from This City Go to San Francisco Meeting.

DELEGATES ARE ENTERTAINED

Special Cars Bearing Eastern Representatives Pass Through Omaha—Want the Next Convention in This City.

Prepared to make a desperate fight to bring the next biennial convention of the National Association of Letter Carriers to Omaha in 1915, nine letter carriers from the Omaha postoffice left last night for San Francisco to attend the convention which convenes there this week.

Following are the Omaha letter carriers who will go to the convention: Albert Saffield, David Reed, Arthur Asher, William Maher, Marcus A. Past, W. C. Bouk, Charles E. A. Johnson, Fred Jorgensen and L. J. Edwards. South Omaha will be represented by S. Jacobson.

L. J. Edwards is not a delegate to the convention, but is going for the express purpose of boosting Omaha for the 1915 convention. The carriers and delegates have the endorsement of the Commercial club, the Omaha press and the city administration in its fight for the next biennial convention.

The first special car came through Omaha this morning en route to the convention from Chicago. On the car were twenty carriers and they were met at the depot by a committee of local carriers, at the head of which was William Maher. The carriers were escorted to the Woodmen cafeteria, where they were breakfasted, after which they were taken about the city in automobiles.

Bandits Rob Toll Taker Upon Bridge of His Collections

As the last "owl" car bound for Council Bluffs left the toll house on the Douglas street bridge early this morning, one was disappearing into the darkness of the Iowa side of the Missouri river, three masked and armed men confronted W. L. McClenahan toll-taker, and while two held him covered with their pistols, the third looted the money drawer, getting between \$75 and \$80. McClenahan's \$25 watch and several dollars of his own money were taken from him also.

"Don't make a zip, or we'll be back and croak you," admonished one of the bandit trio.

The Omaha police in the emergency automobile was at the scene less than half a minute after the bandits got away, but no trace of them could be found. A thorough search of the Iowa side was later made by the Council Bluffs police.

Last night was a heavy one, and there was between \$75 and \$80 in the drawer, said the toll taker. "They made no attempt to open the cash register, knowing, apparently, that only transfers and street car tickets are kept there."

A loaded revolver belonging to McClenahan lay beside the cash register, but this was scorned.

This is the second time within a year that McClenahan has been robbed. The bandits disappeared over the bridge towards Council Bluffs.
