Kerosene-Single Cylinder Machine Is First. Dust begrimed and tired, but with a happy and contented grin that stretched riders checked in at Sixteenth and Farnam streets before 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon after the 123-mile endurance run from Omaha to Tekamah to Fremont

and back to Omaha. Forty-eight started Sunday morning between 8:30 and 8:53, but only twenty-six finished between 4:18 and 5:00, the scheduled time for arrival. The riders all started on time from Omaha, but mechanical troubles and punctures soon eliminated a score before they reached Tekamah, where they were due to check in at 10:38. Several more dropped out before Fremont was reached at 12:52, but those who made Prement and were recuperated by an hour and a half rest and a sumptuous dinner were able

to complete the trip to Omaha. The riders all experienced many hardships on the road, nearly every one losing his directions before the trip was over. Book and McNab, two who rode together, got lost and were directed on a read running north of Blair by a facetious farmer and rode for six miles before they discovered they were victims of a hoaz, Several others couldn't distinguish between the blue signs the committee posted Saturday afternoon and the red and white signs that other clubs had posted and as a result got off the besten path from five to twenty-five miles.
