DETROIT, Aug. 25.—Ty Cobb today twice killed a possible Boston victory and Detroit took the second game of the series, 6 to 5. In the fifth inning Cobb stole home with the flyer run and in the eighth, after capturing Hooper's fly, he made a magnificent return to the plate and prevented Janvria from scoring. Joe Lake, who will probably be sent to Minneapolis soon, started the game for Detroit and lasted less than an inning. Four hits, which produced three runs, sent Willett to the rescue. He was greeted by Janvria's double, which counted Yerkes, but tightened up and pitched splendidly thereafter. A pass to Numanaker, his steal of second and Mundy's single in the fourth gave the world's champions their final run. Managers Lose to White Sox.

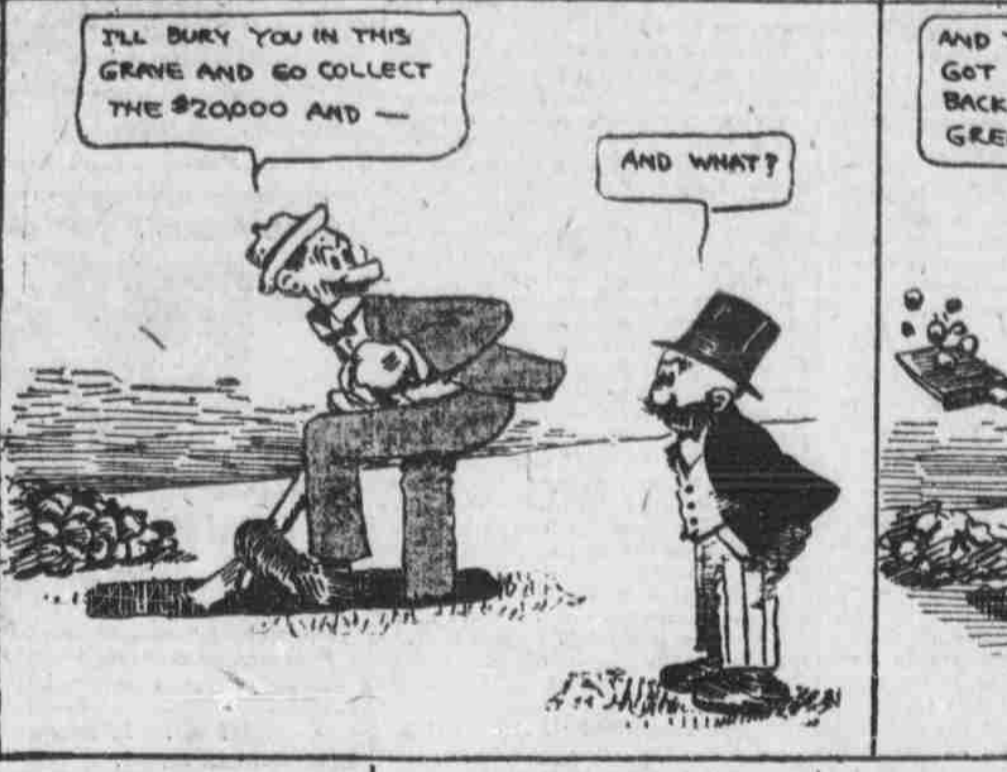

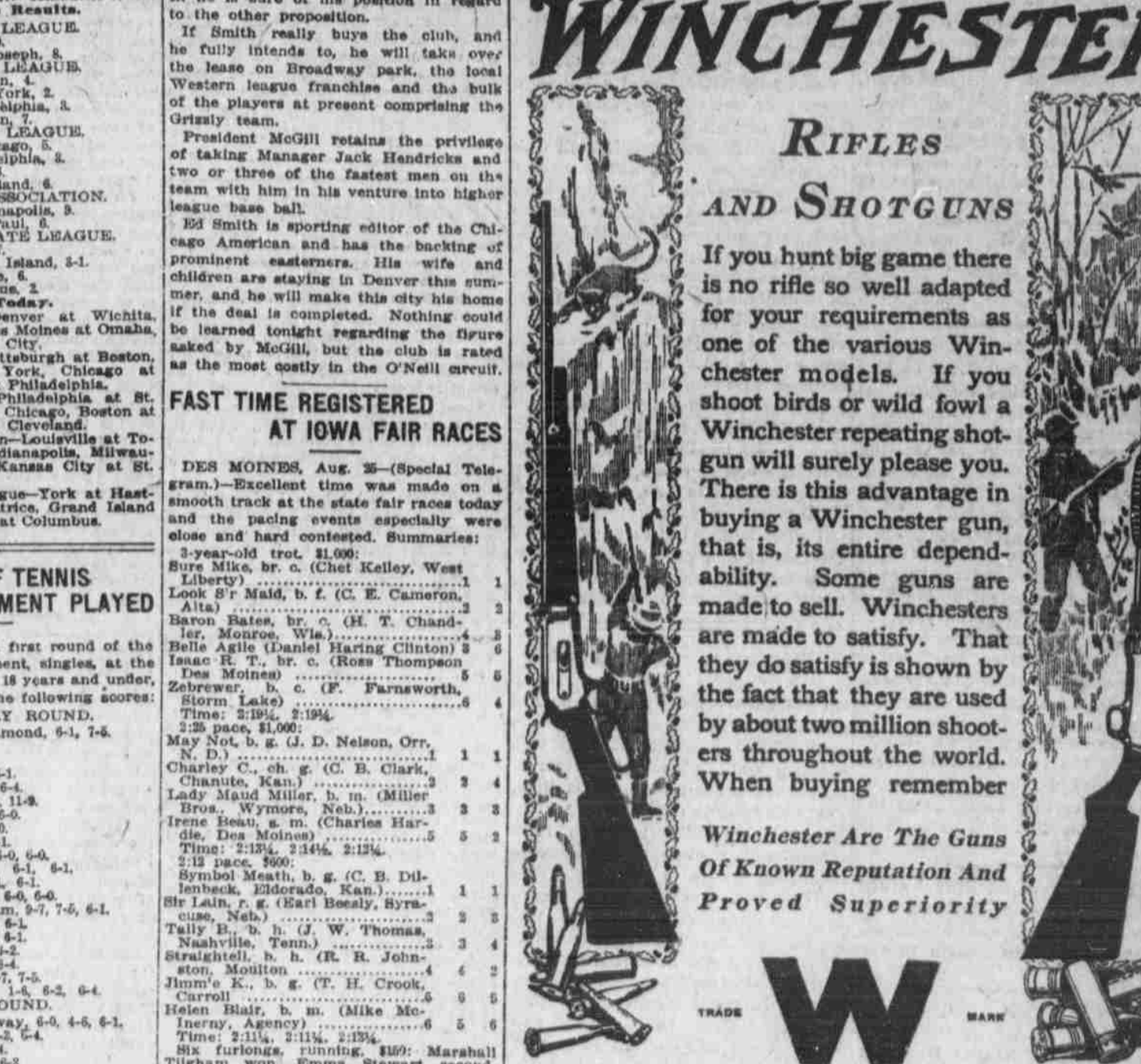
