

ENGLISH CALLS IT A JUNKET

So Declares Trip of Graff and Dr. Holovtchiner. THEY WILL PUT MONEY BACK Decides There is No Essential Difference in This Case from That of the Council Decided by Judge Troup.

Judge English of the district court Tuesday decided that the eastern trip recently made by President Holovtchiner of the school board and Superintendent Graff to inspect technical schools in Cleveland, Detroit and other cities was a junket and ruled that the school board must not pay their expenses. He decided that there was no essential difference between this case and that of City Commissioners Ryder and Kugel recently passed upon by Judge Troup.

Though Dr. Holovtchiner and Mr. Graff drew the money for their expenses from the school board's petty cash fund before the injunction suit was started by Attorney E. A. Smith they will nevertheless "put it back." Attorney Carl Herring, in their behalf, announced in court at the beginning of the hearing that if the judge decided the money was not lawfully paid it would be at once returned. He renounced any advantage resulting from the fact that his clients already had drawn the money by authority of a resolution of the school board.

"What is a junket?" came to be the final issue in the case. Attorney Herring argued that the inspection of the vocational school in Cleveland was for the specific purpose of securing information of value to the community in the proposed building of a similar school here and asked that the court allow payment of the expenses of Superintendent Graff's visit to Cleveland in order to avoid a precedent, which, he asserted, would hinder the progress of the Omaha schools.

Judge English said that in view of the wording of the resolution of the school board authorizing the trip, he thought there was no essential difference between this case and the first anti-junket suit decided by Judge Troup.

Samson to Pay Bill for Lighting Streets During the Carnival. Based on advice of the city legal department, on an interpretation of the decision of district court judge, who held the city could not pay "junket" expenses of public officials, the city council has refused to authorize the usual expenditure for Ak-Sar-Ben street lighting. However, the board of governors of Ak-Sar-Ben will pay the bill, according to "Dad" Weaver. This arrangement was made by the Ak-Sar-Ben board of governors immediately after the opinion of the city attorney holding the city could not legally pay the bill, was submitted to the council. The annual Ak-Sar-Ben street lighting expenses approximate \$1,500.
