OMAHA TAKES THE OPENER

Heavy Hitting of Congalton Saves Day for the Home Team.

SCORE OF THE GAME IS 5 AND 4

Schlipke Back in Old Time Form and in the Eighth Inning Makes One of His Sensational Plays.

"Think" Congalton's slugging in the early stages of yesterday's game gave Omaha the first of the series with Topeka, by a score of 5 to 4, in the battle for fifth position, Congalton scored the first run in the opening inning with a two-base hit and scored Thomason ahead of himself in the third frame by putting the ball over the right field wall. A good-sized crowd was out and witnessed a fine game. It was played in fast time and was snappy and full of pep, considering that the field was slow from recent rains.

Vic Schiltzer, former Athletics pitcher, worked for Omaha and heaved a pretty game. At no time was he pressed, except in the ninth inning and then he tightened, as he did all through the game, at just the right time. The Kaws managed to connect for nine hits, but most of them went for naught. Omaha, on the other hand, secured six hits off Paul Brown, but they were timely ones and gave when they were needed. Of the six, three were doubles and one a homer. A desperate attempt to even up the score in the final round was made by Topeka, but with two runs in and a man on second and but one down Schiltzer settled down and the next two men were easy outs.

Bill Schlipke's Great Play. Bill Schlipke pulled off the sensational play of the game in the eighth inning, when he went back of second base and speared Brown's grounder off the dirt with his meat hand and then made a beautiful peg to Kane, getting the Kaw twirler a few inches away from the sack.

Omaha scored in the opening inning. With one down Thomason forced Coyle at second and scored on Congalton's double to center.
