CELEBRATE THEIR FREEDOM

Negroes Hold Big Barbecue on Anniversary of Emancipation.

HAS HELPED COUNTRY'S RISE

Colored Man Has Done His Share Towards the Upholding and Development of the United States.

Fifty years ago, yesterday, the negroes were freed. In celebration of the Omaha negroes attended a big barbecue at Twenty-fourth and Burdette streets, given under the auspices of the Knights of Tabor, a negro organization. Speeches were made at night by J. G. Pege and Andrew Herold, grand district superintendent of the Knights of Tabor. Judge Estala was out early in the afternoon, but it was so cold he made no speeches. However, the judge waded into the watermelon and the barbecue meats.

Andrew Herold spoke of the work and the advance of the Knights of Tabor. He said of the remarkable advance of the negro race since their freedom, fifty years ago.

"The negro, as an inventor has starred," said Pege. "He has invented many useful articles for the betterment of man. They have sixty-four banks in the United States, aggregating a capital of \$1,600,000. The wealth of the negro race is estimated at between \$20,000,000 and \$30,000,000. There are no negro periodicals. There are Young Men's Christian associations for negroes in forty-six cities and in thirty-two states.

"The negro is the first of all the races in the United States. Patriotically, the negro has taken his part in the development of the country. He was on the firing line in the American Revolutionary war, and helped free this country from England. He fought in the Mexican war, in the civil war and in the Spanish-American war. He has made real developments both for himself and for the country since and before the civil war. In fifty years, from the ignorant slave, he now stands educated and enlightened. The average negro is a church member."

Besides the meats, there was a vast quantity of watermelons and ice cream. Negroes strolled in and out the enclosure all day long. At night, there was a large gathering to attend the speaking.

HOSPITAL NURSE IS STABBED THROUGH HEART

MALDEN, Mass., Sept. 22.—Miss Doris Robinson, a nurse at the Malden hospital, was stabbed while on duty early today by an unidentified man. The intruder had hidden in a medicine closet and when the nurse opened the door to stab her twice near the heart, then jumped through a window and escaped. Miss Robinson's condition is critical.

TELLS HOW TO RAISE FUNDS

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AMERICAN SCHOOL SEIZED PRESIDENT EXPECTS TO SIGN TARIFF BILL BEFORE WEEK CLOSES

Greeks Take Possession of Mission at Koritsa, Albania.

BRITISH CONSUL PROTESTS

Handed Girls Given Protection in the School and Its Seizure is a Part of the Program of Terror.

VIENNA, Sept. 22.—The Greek authorities at Koritsa in Albania today seized the American mission school, where protection is given to nearly 100 Albanian girls. The information reached here in a telegram from Avlona, the principal seaport of Albania on the Adriatic sea. The Greeks have also arrested and persecuted a large number of Albanians who recently returned to Koritsa from America and other foreign countries, releasing them from detention only when the Albanians promised to join in the agitation for the incorporation of the district in Greece.

The British consul at Monastir has entered a vigorous protest with the Greek government on behalf of the Americans. The whole affair forms part of the Greek territorialization of the Albanian population, with the object of compelling them to agree to the inclusion of the whole of southern Albania in the kingdom of Greece.

Last week Greek officials at Koritsa endeavored to take forcible possession of the American mission school building, but the housekeeper in charge refused to hand over the keys. The Greek soldiers, however, marched in and carried her off to prison.

The mission is in charge of Phineas B. Kennedy, a native of New Jersey and a Princeton graduate. Mrs. Violet B. Kennedy conducts the Ladies' Literary society, whose object is to give the elements of education to the women of Albania.

Controlled by Congressmen. NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—The American mission school in Koritsa, Albania, is under supervision of the Congressional church and controlled by the American board of commissioners for foreign missions. Dr. Edward L. Smith, secretary for the organization in New York, said today that the American missionaries encountered great opposition from the Turkish authorities. Since the close of the Balkan war the board received assurances through the American Department of State that the Greek government would withdraw all further obstacles in the way of its work.

MISSIONARIES ARE IN DANGER

Americans Are Afraid to Return to Stations in Fo Kien.

PEKING, China, Sept. 22.—Although the British and French missionaries who had taken refuge in P'u Chow have returned to their mission homes in Hing Wa and Sin Yu, in the Great Northern east, the American missionaries remain there because the Chinese authorities declare they cannot guarantee their lives.

Americans are especially disliked by General Hwang Liang, who during the anti-Manchu revolt proclaimed himself the sixteenth Ming emperor. Hwang Liang had encouraged the replanting of the poppy in the province. The American missionaries informed the government of this and urged military action. After the poppy had been uprooted Hwang Liang's followers regained control of several districts, where they persecuted or assassinated a number of Christian converts.

When the town of Hing Wa was attacked by Hwang Liang the missionaries took refuge in P'u Chow. The American legation has vainly urged the Chinese government to protect American citizens in China with the aid of the military.

At the legation it is considered that the Chinese officials are taking advantage of American friendship in various pending cases in which the legation cannot obtain satisfaction.

IOWA CITY, Ia., Sept. 22.—(Special.)—After expelling the Delta Gamma sorority from the Women's Pan-Hellenic association at the State University of Iowa, with a resolution denouncing their action in pledging before the designated time as "unfair and dishonorable," the other members of the association withdrew yesterday and indulged in a mad scramble for pledges all day Sunday. The Delta Gammas pledged Kathryn, Mary and Helen, having been ill for some months. It was thought she was on the road to recovery, but a stroke of paralysis proved fatal.

THREE DEAD, FORTY INJURED

Heavily Loaded Trolley Trains Collide Near New York City

COLLISION OCCURS ON A CURVE

Three Men Killed Are Employees and Most of Those Injured Are Either Mechanics or Laborers.

NEW YORK, Sept. 22.—Three persons were killed and twenty injured early today in a head-on crash of two Long Island railroad electric trains at College Point, Long Island. Of the injured, one will die. The dead are: CONDUCTOR GEORGE BURCKEL, MOTORMAN FRED LODER, MOTORMAN CHARLES HOHLIEN.

Most of the injured were mill employees on their way to work. The crash occurred on a curve. The trains, running forty miles an hour, rounded the curve from opposite directions almost simultaneously. The steel cars buckled, but did not telescope. This fact doubtless saved many lives.

A hotel near the scene and a number of residences nearby were thrown open for use as emergency hospitals. Many ambulances and a corps of physicians were summoned to the scene.

The Pennsylvania railroad issued a statement explaining that the accident had been caused, so far as could be determined, by the negligence of the operator at Whitestone Junction, who allowed the train bound for New York to leave the double track before the other train had cleared. The road's statement placed the total number of injured at forty.

Tank Scrap Victim Dies of Broken Neck

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Sept. 22.—That Frank Obenchain of South Whitley, Ind., the Purdue university student, whose death occurred during the "tank scrap" at Lafayette last Friday night, died of a broken neck, the declaration today of Dr. A. H. MacBeth, who made a post-mortem examination at South Whitley Saturday night. At the time of Obenchain's death, it was announced in Lafayette, that he had died of heart failure, superinduced by excitement.

Dr. MacBeth, with Dr. E. L. Canada, was summoned from Fort Wayne to South Whitley by the boy's father to conduct the examination. They were assisted by three South Whitley physicians and the five, according to Dr. MacBeth, are in accord as to conditions found.

Two Fast Trains Go Into the Ditch

EVERETT, Wash., Sept. 22.—Several coaches of the Great Northern east-bound overland train No. 4, were derailed this morning near Mukilton, and before warning could be given the westbound overland No. 3, on another track, crashed into a portion of the wreckage that was scattered over both tracks.

Eleven persons are reported injured, one seriously, as a result of the double wreck.

DEATH RECORD

Walter McKay. LEAD, S. D., Sept. 22.—(Special.)—After a long illness with consumption, Walter McKay, for many years postmaster and prominent citizen here, died at his home. He had tried Arizona for several years, but was unable to fight off the ravages of the disease and returned here a year ago. Mr. McKay was 54 years old and had resided here since 1881. He was postmaster from 1908 to 1910 and former chairman of the republican county central committee. He is survived by a wife and three children. He will have a Masonic funeral.

Mrs. F. L. Cook. LYONS, Neb., Sept. 22.—(Special.)—Mrs. F. L. Cook died at her home in Lyons Saturday night, aged 41 years, leaving a husband, four sons and one daughter. She had been ailing for the last two years, but the immediate cause of her death was heart failure. She also leaves a mother, Mrs. M. H. Sheffer; brother, John; and sister, Martha Sheffer, all living in Omaha, and one sister in Chicago and one in Langburn, Neb.

Mrs. W. H. Weeden. OSCEOLA, Neb., Sept. 22.—(Special.)—Mrs. W. H. Weeden, wife of one of Osceola's business men, died this morning at 7:30, having been ill for some months. It was thought she was on the road to recovery, but a stroke of paralysis proved fatal.

First Tea Party is Given on Airship

BERLIN, Sept. 22.—The first tea party ever given aboard an airship took place yesterday while the Zeppelin passenger ship Sachsen was in flight near Berlin.

Twelve women and eight men were the guests of Dr. Feist-Woolheim of this city. Counting the crew, the Sachsen carried thirty persons.

One of the guests described the innovation as an unqualified success. A cruise of about fifty-five miles was made. No heating apparatus is carried on the Sachsen, because of the danger of gas explosion, so the tea, milk, water and toast had to be taken up already warmed.

Bulgaria and Turkey May Fight Greece

COLOGNE, Germany, Sept. 22.—According to the correspondent of the Cologne Gazette at Constantinople, the foreign ambassadors to Turkey believe it quite possible for the Turks and Bulgarian armies to come to an agreement to operate jointly against Greece if that nation refuses the condition of peace proposed by Turkey.

The Turkish government newspapers advance the same idea. General Michael Savaoff, commander-in-chief of the Bulgarian army, is in Constantinople.
