

ing from unchanged figures to a loss of 74c. Arrivals of wheat for twenty-four hours at Winnipes, Minneapolis and Duluth reached a total of nearly 3,009,000 bushels. In the two last named cities, the move-ment was more than 300 carloads in excess of the receipts from the bumper crop of 1912. It was no wonder, therefore, that prices here were depressed from the start, and that bear leaders sedged the chance to hammer the market.
