Brown, \$7,000 Montgomery Recruit, Causes Sensation by Holding New Yorks Hitless and Runless Six Frames.

BROOKLYN, N. Y., Sept. 26.—The New Yorks drew a step near the flag-clipping point by beating Brooklyn, 4 to 2, this afternoon.
