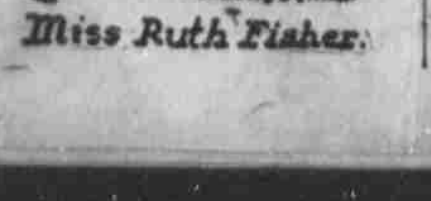

Parade Floats Will Not Be Sold This Year. The twenty magnificent floats that made up the electrical parade this year are to be torn down at home this year instead of being sold or rented to another town for a parade. "We don't want to cheapen the thing by letting them go out of the city this year," said Everett Buckingham, president of the Ak-Sar-Ben board of governors. "Last year we sent them to Denver for their big parade there, and when the parade came off they advertised them as coming from the New York Hippodrome. That is all the credit we got for the workmanship on those floats. That is all the credit Omaha got. So we have decided to keep the floats at home. They are standing outside the Dan now and the boys are cutting strips off them." Mr. Buckingham says it looks like a shame, but he says, "I believe we can afford it. It costs us a lot of money each year to get up those floats, but rather than to sell them or rent them to another town to use as Denver used them last year, we will destroy them after we are through with them."
