"Cy" Falkenberg Holds Pittsburgh to Two Hits in Opener.

SCORE IS THREE TO NOTHING

Dolan, Chapman, Wagner and Johnston All Contribute Fine Fielding Play—Teams Play Again Today.

CLEVELAND, O., Oct. 6.—"Cy" Falkenberg held the Pittsburgh Nationals to two hits in the opening game of their post-season series today and Cleveland took the first game, 3 to 0. With two out in the second inning, Miller walked and Mitchell got Pittsburgh's first hit, a single to left. Gibson then flied out. In the sixth with one out, Carey got the visitors' other hit, a single to center. Dolan walked, but Hans Wagner hit into a double play. Thereafter Pittsburgh never got a man to first base. In the first inning Johnston's fumble and a poor throw by Carich enabled Carey to reach second. Only one other Pittsburgh runner got that far and none reached third.

Cleveland got three hits in the first inning, but a pretty throw by Dolan caught Jackson at the plate. Adams kept Cleveland's hits scattered until the sixth, when Jackson's single and Lajoie's long double scored the first run. In the seventh Cleveland scored two more on Olson's single, Dolan's wild throw of Graney's grounder and Wagner's wild throw to the plate on Falkenberg's infield hit.

Dolan, Chapman, Wagner and Johnston all contributed fine fielding plays.

The teams play tomorrow and McQuinn for Pittsburgh and Goss for Cleveland probably will pitch. Scores:

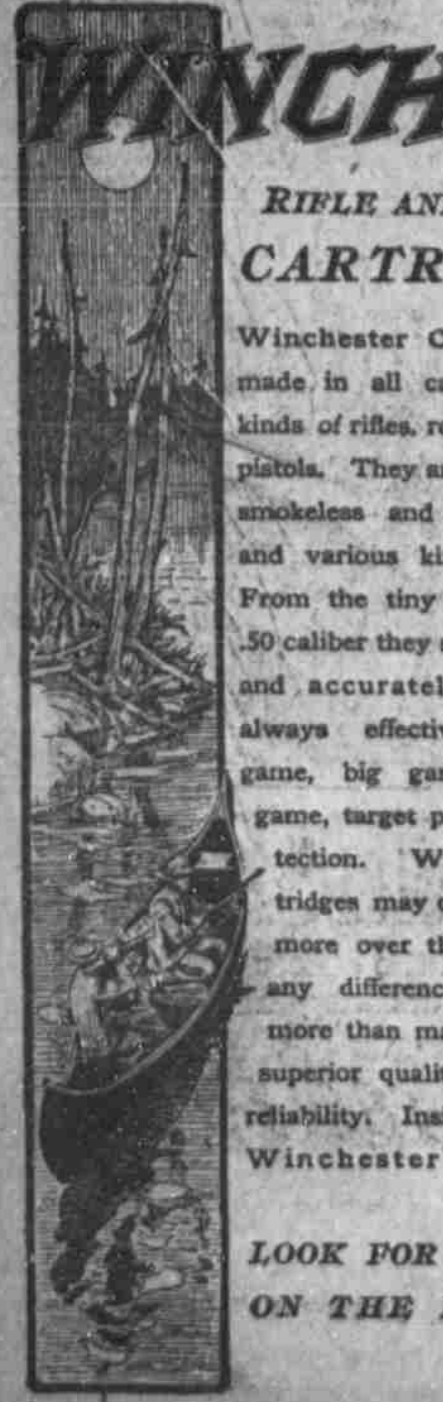

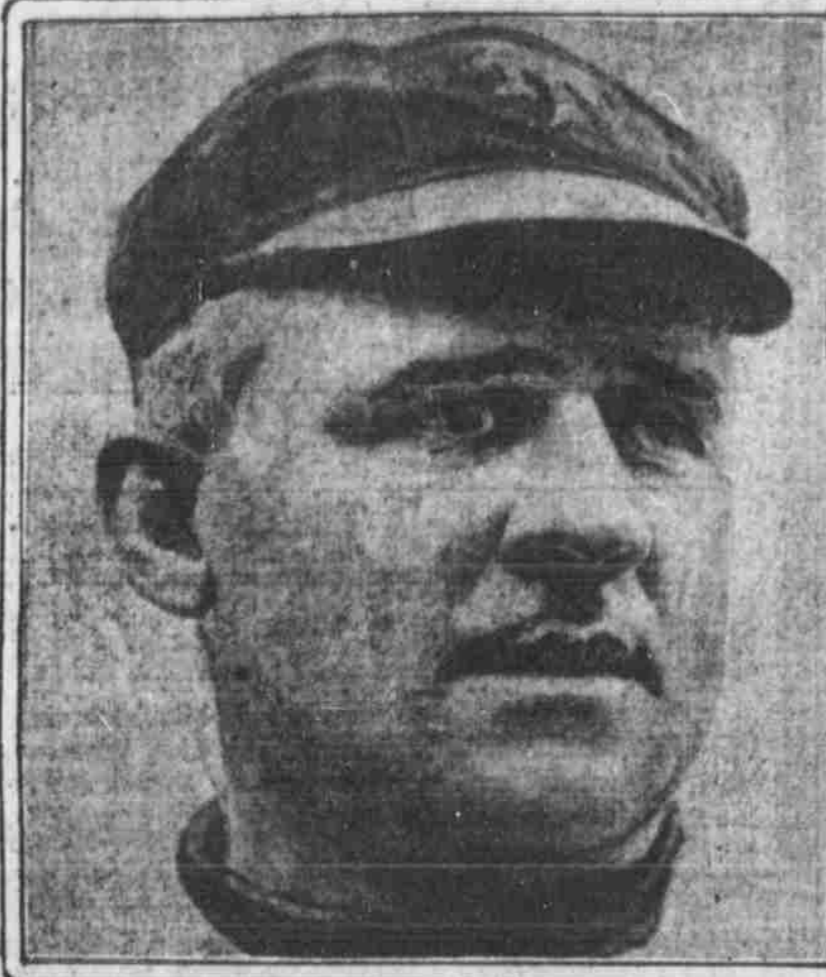

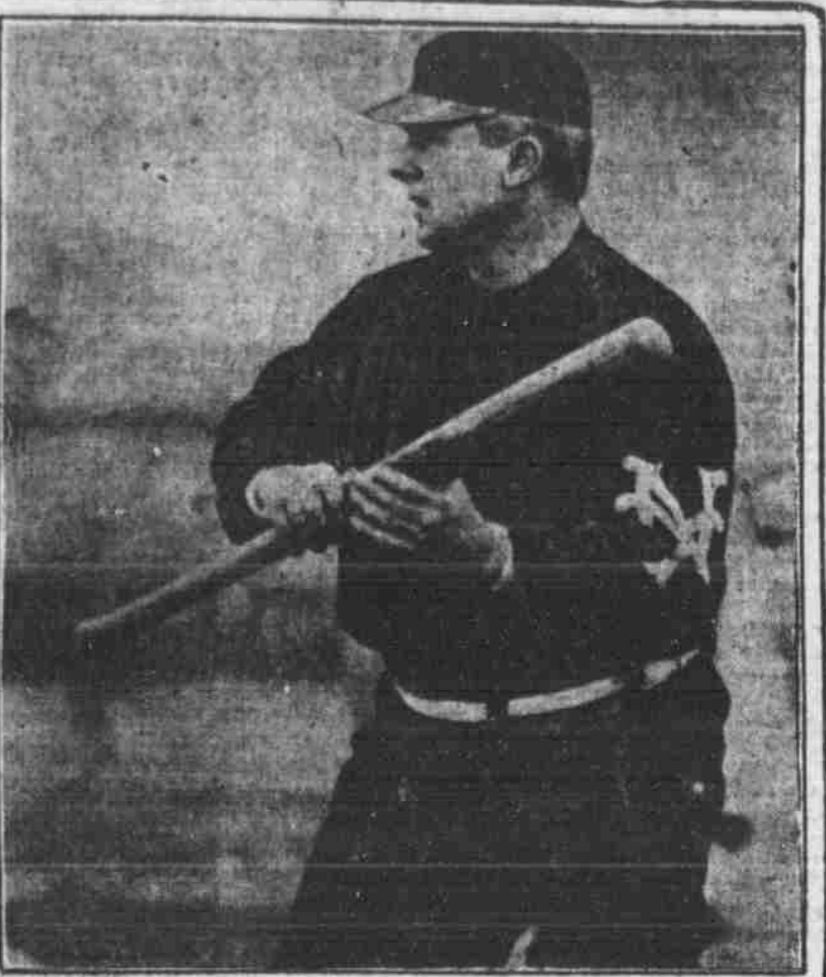

MCGRAW USES MANY PLAYERS

Several Field Events Felled Off, Lobert Beating Thorpe in Hundred-Yard Dash in Thirteen Seconds.

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—In an exhibition game here this afternoon the champion Giants and the Philadelphia Nationals set a new record for speed for a full game between major league teams, the time being 31.1. With McGraw hustling in new players in rapid succession, the contest resembled a rapid-fire target practice on a battleship. The Giants won by 4 to 1.

Preceding the game there were several field events. In a 100-yard dash Lobert beat Thorpe in 13 seconds. The Jung hitting contest went to Thorpe with a rap of 44 feet and Lobert won the chase around the bases in 18 seconds. Score:

Giants' Manager Best Liked and Most Hated Man in Game

The most distinctive and aggressive personality in base ball—this is John J. McGraw, the wonderful leader of the Giants. He has been at one and the same time the most abused and most admired man in the national game.

He has been called a rowdy and a Napoleon in equal parts. He has been mixed up in more rows than any big league manager; but he has also been mixed up in more pennants. Only Connie Mack has equaled his record of five championships in ten years, and McGraw has one thing on the leader of the Athletics in that he never once brought his title hand down to the finish mark in the second division.

Mack is his only rival for the title of the greatest manager in the game, and no two men in the world were ever more widely apart in character and methods than these two. The old fox of Philadelphia has been dealt with elsewhere. His system of careful, constructive work, leaving nothing to chance.

McGraw's motto is: "Take a chance any time, and fight all the time."

He believes especially in fighting, but he is of the mind of Polonius in not advocating fighting as an end. It is always a means with McGraw. There is method in his mixing. He has been represented as running amuck through base ball for the low of a rough-house. Nothing is further from the truth. When McGraw has a row on the ball field he figures that he is going to win something material at some time as a result.

For instance, you never hear of any of the Giants being suspended or fined for battling with the umpires these days. Why? Because McGraw discovered that the managers meant business in their manifestations against bull-ranging the arbiters and the chief of the Giants decided that a star on the field was worth six on the bench, recovering from the effects of easing their minds to an umpire.

"I'll do all the kicking from now on," he told his warriors, "if any man is benched by an umpire I'll fine him myself. Let 'em put me out of the game. I'm not out there playing."

He has carried his pugnacious personality into the offensive tactics of his club. He believes in going at the other team with a rush, taking all necessary chances and playing them off their feet. For this reason he demands speed of his men. He can make shift to get along without brains, but he will not allow a slow man.

"It is possible to get good base ball out of a bonthead," he said once, "if you never expect to think. Whenever there is any thinking to be done, do it for him, and lead on him with both feet if he tries to do any himself."

By following this system he has annually made popular heroes out of notoriously slow-witted athletes. He is out there on the coaching line thinking for them. And he is the quickest and most daring thinker in base ball.

It is characteristic of his aggressive mind that he is the only base ball leader who has no use for the sacrifice hit. There is no doubt that he has lost many ball games by not using it, but there is also no doubt that he has won many a game by discarding it. He follows offensive tactics of the dashing kind. He is all for the hit-and-run and the double steal. He believes in hitters and always has at least a better than average hitting club, and his argument is that there is no sense in getting .300 hitters and ordering them to chuck away a one-in-three chance for a clean hit to advance a man a base at the cost of an out.

He is like Connie Mack in that he relies completely on his own judgment. He is the boss—he gives the orders and takes the blame. He never breaks into print with anything like a criticism of

Chief Incidents in Base Ball Life of Manager McGraw

John J. McGraw—Born at Truxton, N. Y., April 7, 1872. Began playing base ball professionally with the Clean (N. Y.) club in 1890, and in 1891 joined the Cedar Rapids team. Before the end of that season he was secured by the Baltimore tall-end club and played second base. When Ned Hanlon took charge of the Orioles in 1893 he shifted McGraw to third, which position he played until he came to New York as manager of the New York Nationals. In 1895 McGraw, with Catcher Robinson, was sold to the St. Louis National league club. In 1897 McGraw and Robinson organized a new Baltimore club and placed it in the American league. After many quarrels with Ban Johnson, president of the American league, McGraw sold out his club to the New York Nationals in the middle of the season of 1902. McGraw and several of the players were transferred to New York, of which team McGraw became manager. Under McGraw the Giants won the National league championship in 1904-5 and the world's title in 1905, lost the National league pennant by a technicality in 1906, finished third in 1907, second in 1908, and first in 1911, 1912 and 1913. The Giants lost the world's series with the Athletics in 1911 and in 1913 were beaten by the Boston Red Sox.

PACKERS LOSE TO HIGH BOYS

Omaha Team Walks Away from South Omaha, 47 to 0.

WERE MATCHED IN WEIGHT

Both Elevens Are of About the Same Avoidupots, but Local Squad's Team Work is Too Much for the Opposition.

Omaha High made short work of the South Omaha eleven Monday afternoon, coming out of the contest with the bigger end of a 47 to 0 score. Seven touchdowns piled up the Omaha score, which was increased by the kicking of five of these goals.

The Omaha eleven was on the offensive from the beginning of the contest and did not allow the Packers to carry the pigskin within twenty yards of their goal once during the entire game.

As in the Creighton High game two weeks ago, Platz was the star of the contest. He seemed able to find the weak spots in the opponent's line at every turn advanced the ball for great gains of fifteen and twenty yards continually. The plucky half was responsible for three of the touchdowns and besides hitting carrying the ball over the South Omaha line himself, aided materially in advancing the pigskin for all the remaining touchdowns of the contest.

Coach Mills of the Omaha eleven ran in a number of the second team men in the last half and the reserves showed up almost as well as the first team men against the Packers. The outcome of the game was not doubtful for an instant after the first five minutes of play.

When Berry carried the ball under South Omaha's goal in the first quarter the Omaha rosters went wild. When this was followed a few moments later by Reese's advance of the pigskin over the visitors' line the crowd sat back, feeling that rooting was unnecessary.

The second quarter netted Omaha another touchdown as the result of spectacular gains by Klein, Omaha's right end.

Many Touchdowns Follow. The remaining touchdowns were executed in quick succession in the second half, the Omaha eleven experiencing no difficulty whatever in breaking through the South Omaha line. Gardner's boot was especially serviceable, both in kicking goals after touchdowns and in punting for gain.

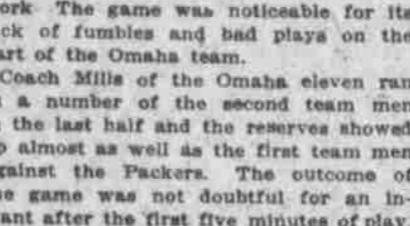

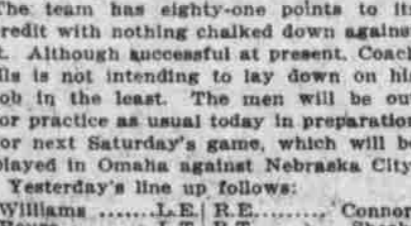

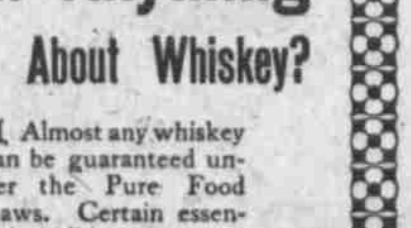
