INFORMATION FOR TEACHERS

Three Separate and Complete Bureaus Will Be Maintained.

HAVE RECEPTION COMMITTEES

Many Business Houses Have Extended Invitations to State Teachers to Visit Plants During Convocation.

The information work in connection with the Nebraska State Teachers' association, to convene in Omaha November 6 and 7, is to be more complete this year than ever before, as three distinct information bureaus are to be established. There will be a permanent information bureau at the Hotel Rome. There is to be another at the Young Men's Christian association, and a third at the High school building. At each of these places the girls in charge will work in three shifts.

Besides these there is to be a reception committee to receive teachers at the Union station, the Burlington station and the Webster street station. To a certain extent these people will act as an information bureau also, as they will give directions to all teachers as they arrive. Someone will go to the cars with them and give them the directions as to how to reach their hotel or boarding place.

Already many of the business houses of the city have sent invitations asking that the teachers be taken through their plants as an excursion. Manager Parrish of the publicity bureau is anxious that others who desire to register such invitations do so as soon as possible so that he may lay all of them before the association at once.

All the committees on local arrangements have been appointed. They were appointed by heads of each committee. The chairman of each committee will fill in the names of his committee.
