DETROIT, Oct. 14.—The constituent members of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States of America, including local chambers of commerce, boards of trade, commercial clubs and national trade organizations in all parts of the country, has approved by referendum vote the report of its banking and currency committee on the Owen-Glass currency bill now pending in congress.

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It was openly declared by low church delegates that the resolution, as introduced by the high church members, left the way clear for the commission to decide for the whole house of deputies that the church name should be changed.

The resolution to "revise and enrich" the book of common prayer, was offered by the diocese of California and the missionary district of Arizona which asked that a commission of seven bishops, seven presbyters and seven laymen consider the matter and report at the next triennial convention.

Dr. Randolph H. McKim of Washington, low church leader, declared the appointment of such a commission was the opening move toward changing the church name.

He offered a resolution providing that no proposals to change the title page of the prayer book or the name of the church shall be referred to said commission.

Dr. Edward L. Goodwin of Virginia offered an amendment: "Provided that no proposition involving the faith and doctrine of the church shall be considered or reported upon by the commission."

NEW AGREEMENTS ASKED OF WESTERN RAILROADS

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HUERTA BECOMES DICTATOR

Text of His Decree is Received at Washington.

SUSPENDS THE CONSTITUTION

Section Granting Exemption to Members of Congress from Arrest Declared Repealed—To Legislate by Decrees.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Copies of a proclamation by Provisional President Huerta announcing himself as dictator over Mexico were received at the State department today and considered at the cabinet meeting at the White House.

Huerta declared suspended that provision of the constitution which grants immunity from arrest to members of the Mexican congress and announces that he will from time to time issue executive decrees because of the dissolution of congress.

Huerta's decree, dated October 11, says in part: "In view of the fact that the chamber of deputies and senators of the congress of the union have been dissolved and incapacitated to perform their functions, and in view of the powers which I hold in the department of government, according to the decree of October 11, this year I have seen fit to decree that article 1, the constitutional exemption from arrest and judicial action, which the citizens which form the Twenty-sixth congress of the union enjoyed in view of their functions, is hereby repealed, and consequently they are subject to the jurisdiction of the tribunals corresponding to the case in the event that they are guilty of any crime or offense."

Fire Results from Peculiar Explosion

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A mysterious explosion that has so far been unaccounted for, badly wrecked and set fire to the home of John Relf, 719 Fourth street at 8:45 o'clock last night.

The windows at both ends of the house were blown out and the south side of the building was pushed outward.

The explosion was so great that glass from the windows in a flash of flame shot across the street. A flash of flame shot through the dwelling, burning up loose curtains, lighting paper on the walls and damaging light articles.

Mr. Relf is a brother of Peter Relf, the veteran justice of the peace at Manawa. He is more than seventy years old and his wife about the same age.

Mrs. Relf was confident last night that she did not use a match when she went to the closet. The closest investigation last night failed to reveal the presence of any explosive material about the house.

The interior of the house presented a scene of as much confusion as if the destruction had been caused by a powder explosion. The north side of the building was not damaged at all, but the whole south side was bulged outward, every window at both ends blown out and doors wrenched off. The loss is difficult to estimate. Insurance to the amount of \$2,000 was carried on the building and \$500 on the contents.

The automobile truck was out of commission at the moment on account of adjustments being made upon the clutch mechanism, but the other companies had no difficulty in controlling the fire.

Man Illegally Restrained.

Representations were made to the supreme court today by attorneys that by order of Judge Howell in Iowa City William Moser is being held illegally in jail as a part of a scheme to prevent him prosecuting a suit against the Rock Island railway.

Moser is said to have been accused of breaking a window in the station. The court will make investigation of the case.
