Congregationalists Ask Law Requiring Health Certificates

The Congregationalists of Nebraska adopted a resolution Monday night at St. Mary's Avenue church, which was drawn up by Rev. J. A. Leavitt, superintendent of the Society of the Friends, to the effect that ministers of the Congregational denomination shall request a clean bill of health from all couples that come before them to be married, and that the Congregationalists shall lend their influence toward the passing of a state law requiring health certificates in order to secure a license. The resolution reads:

Whereas, There is a wave of vice sweeping over the country; and Whereas, This vice wave is the most prolific source of divorce; and Whereas, This last year there was about one divorce for every three and one-half marriages in the Congregational church in Douglas county and one in seven in the rest of the state; and Whereas, The majority of our criminals come from broken homes. Therefore, be it Resolved, That we favor a law requiring a clean bill of health from all seeking a license to marry.

Government Will in Future Auction Land

After getting through with the registration for the North Platte forest reserve and the Fort Niobrara military reservation, the government is going to let go of the lottery plan for the disposition of public land and adopt the auction method. Starting November 1, the government will sell to the highest bidder \$,000 acres of land on the Wind River Indian reservation. The sale will be held at Riverton, Wyo. It is said this land can all be irrigated and a large portion is suitable for agricultural purposes. The balance is pasture. It will be sold in tracts of eighty acres, or more to the highest bidder, a small cash payment being required, with the balance on long time.
