SHARP DISCUSSION

Majority of Committee is Opposed to Separate Churches and Dioceses for Negroes-Action is Postponed.

NEW YORK, Oct. B .- A heated debate over the negro question in the south, enlivened the deliberations of the house of deputies of the Protestant Episcopal church at today's session of the general

A majority report by the committee on churches, dioceses, clergy and bishops for southern negroes was presented. A minority report advocating the separation of the races and the appointment of negro bishops to sit in the house of clitate the passage of the aviators, bishops with powers equal to the whites. Large supplies of liquid fuel and lubricat-

Amid a storm of discussion the house made consideration of both reports the order of business for the afternoon session tomorrow, limiting debats on each side to half an hour.

"The proposal is a radical violation of the principles and custems of diocessan union." asserts the majority report read by the Rev. Dr. C. B. Bryan of North Carolina. "With the utmost friendship for our negro brethren and with the desire to advance the work of the church among them we still cannot believe that as a race they are prepared for an independent ecclesiastical administration.

.To this declaration the muerty, consisting of Bishop Kinselving of Texas. Bishop Chaushirs of North Carolina and the Rev. Dr. J. McPittinger of Raleight, N. C., took sharp exceptions.

"The white people and she negro people of the south," said the minority report, "cannot be dealt with by the church without a sharp and positive separation and distinction between the two, in worship, and in all corporate, ecclesiastical activities, as well as in social life.
