URGES VOCATIONAL SCHOOLS

Dean Fordyce Pleads for Home Training in Classrooms.

FACTORIES ROB THE HOMES

Homemaking Arts Are Unknown in the Homes and Schools Are Wanting in Serious Duties of Everyday Life.

"It is doubtful if our children are receiving as good an education as our forefathers did," said Dean Fordyce to the members of the Omaha Woman's club at the meeting Monday afternoon.

"The factories have robbed the home of the homemaking arts and our schools are wanting in that element of the serious duties of life," he said. "The child must look elsewhere for this element which is taking pupils from the high schools that they may receive a vocational training from other institutions. There is only one alternative; to install it in the schools. The high school must fit the scholars for bread winners."

Dean Fordyce complimented Superintendent Graft upon the stand he has taken in advocating the vocational training in the public schools of Omaha.

"Many a young man has done wisely in leaving common school and gone to the vocational school, which offered more. Education is worth little that does not include the vocational, as well as the cultural, training, and we must teach our children how to earn and how to appreciate the necessities of life."

"The social reformer does not reach the heart of the trouble. Relief work is most commendable, but civilization needs enlightenment. Extreme specialization is converting the laboring people into a class of expert tools and only one hundredth part of the body is doing actual work and needs rest at the close of the day's work, while the other ninety-nine need exercise."

Dean Fordyce made a plea for schools in the near future where children might have a type of training that would touch the needs of every one and until that time he said the public schools of today were failures.

Reports from the state convention of Federated Women's Clubs were read by the delegates to the state convention which was held at York October 6, 7, 8 and 9.

Letters from prominent women in Omaha were received by Mrs. Hayes, president of the club, asking that the Omaha Woman's club commend President Wilson for allowing Mrs. Pankhurst to be admitted to the United States. Mrs. Hayes brought the matter before the club, but no member was willing to make a motion to this effect and the matter was dropped.

LOCAL METHODIST UNION TO INVITE BISHOPS HERE

The Methodist union will hold a meeting Friday evening at the Young Men's Christian association rooms. It is probable that an invitation will be drawn up at this meeting to be forwarded to the bishops now meeting in St. Louis asking them to meet in Omaha for their next annual spring conference.

GREAT SWIMMING FEAT

New England Champion Covers Fourteen Miles with Hands and Feet Tied.

Henry Ellensky of New London, Conn., made a new world's record October 5 by swimming from the Battery to within half a mile of Coney island with handcuffs on his wrists and his ankles bound together with two strands of half-inch rope.

The nearest approach to this feat, except other attempts by Ellensky, is said to have been that of Miss Katherine Wallace of Philadelphia, who was credited with having made something less than a mile under similar conditions.

The actual distance traversed by Ellensky was fourteen miles, as he time and again staggered across the channel in order to take advantage of the shifting tide currents. At the finish he was as strong, apparently, as at the start, and easily could have completed his undertaking, but for the advice of his brother, Morris Ellensky, and Captain Joseph Palagiar of the power schooner Idle Hour, who thought further stay in the water would be dangerous on account of the darkness.

The start was made from the barge landing, the Battery, at 12:36 p. m., and the swimmer left the water at 4:30 p. m., making the elapsed time five hours and thirty-four minutes. The distance between the two points in as nearly a straight line as can be followed is thirteen miles.

During the entire time Ellensky took no food, water nor stimulants, and did not change his method of swimming, which was exactly that of a dolphin—plunging through the water generally with his head completely buried. Early in the effort his eyes began to give him trouble, and after a short time he could scarcely see at all. Thereafter he was guided by calls from a small boat that kept close to him.

"Turn over and take a rest," he was advised.

"I'll drown if I do," was the cheerful reply, and he kept up the steady plunging during the entire trip.

The handcuffs, of steel, or regulation pattern, with one link between them. They were locked on by Deputy Sheriff John E. von Muege of New York, who held the key and accompanied the swimmer to see that they were not tampered with. The ropes were tied by a sailor at the barge office, and so tightly were they fastened that when it came time to take them off it was with difficulty that they were removed.

Ellensky passed Governor's Island at 1:37 o'clock; he reached the Narrows at 3 o'clock, and he went by the forts just as the evening gun was fired. When he was taken aboard the schooner he was practically at his destination's end and going strongly.

For a part of the way Sunday Ellensky was accompanied in the water by Paul O. Frommhold of the American Life Saving society, who lives at 441 East Seventy-ninth street, Manhattan. But Frommhold found the water too cold for his liking and returned to the schooner.

The fear that a passing boat might cripple the swimmer, who was invisible at any distance, caused his advisors to have him give up the attempt to reach Coney. Bound hand and foot, as he was, it was thought that his life would be endangered by contact with any kind of craft or delirious, but not until Captain Palagiar shouted to him would he consent to come to the boat—New York Tribune.

CALL EXTENDED TO PASTOR BY CEDAR FALLS BAPTISTS

CEDAR RAPIDS, Ia., Oct. 21.—(Special Telegram.)—Members of the Baptist church have extended a call to Rev. J. A. Vanner of Estherville to become their pastor, and he will enter on his new duties the first Sunday in November. He succeeds Dr. E. B. Jones, now of Owatonna, Minn.

Dr. J. W. Holland of Aurora, Ill., began his labors as pastor of the Methodist Episcopal church in this city yesterday to succeed Dr. Titus Lowe, removed to the First Methodist church, Omaha.

WILSON AND BRYAN RUFFLED

Displeased by Action of British Minister to Mexico.

PAGE MAKES FORMAL INQUIRY

English Ambassador Presented Credentials Same Day Huerta Proclaimed Himself Dictator of His Country.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21.—While there was no change in either the status of affairs at Mexico City or the American policy, an international phase of the Mexican situation that attracted wide attention tonight was the formal inquiry made earlier today by Ambassador Page at London as to what was construed here as an unpropitious attitude toward the United States by Sir Lionel Carden, the British minister to Mexico.

It is understood that the basis of the inquiry was a confidential report to the State department, the contents of which were not divulged here. It is known, however, that what particularly displeased both President Wilson and Secretary Bryan was the presentation by Sir Lionel of his credentials to provisional President Huerta, the very day after the latter had proclaimed himself dictator. The American government felt that Huerta's nullification of the Mexican constitution not only by his arrest of the deputies but by his assumption of legislative powers had so altered affairs in the Mexican capital that the British minister might well have withheld his presentation of credentials. Inquiry was directed to determine whether the British Foreign office had instructed Sir Lionel to present his credentials notwithstanding Huerta's assumption of power.

The explanation of the British Foreign office noted in press dispatches that the presentation of credentials was merely a coincidence.

Financial Report of Board of Education Indicates Deficit

Secretary W. T. Bourke's financial report before the Board of Education last night showed an expenditure for the first nine months of the year of \$113,000 more than for the same nine months of 1912. At this rate, the board members said, a deficit of \$10,000 would exist if the 1914 school licenses were applied on 1913 expenditures. These licenses are received immediately after the first of the year.

CENTRAL LABOR UNION ORDERS PROTEST ON BASON

A delegation from the Central Labor union appeared before the Board of Education last night to protest against the employment of P. W. Bason as instructor in the manual training arts at the Fort special school for boys. They based their protest on the allegation that he was not a union man and that he had been employed by the railroad for which he works to instruct strikebreakers.

STEAMER BEARING COLONEL ARRIVES OFF RIO JANEIRO

RIO JANEIRO, Brazil, Oct. 21.—The seamer Vandrek, with Colonel Theodore Roosevelt aboard, arrived off Rio Janeiro tonight, but owing to tempestuous weather, according to a wireless dispatch, it will not enter port until midnight. Colonel Roosevelt and his party will come ashore at 8 o'clock tomorrow morning.

COLD WEATHER OVER WEST

Tail of Windstorm Brings First Snow to Many Places.

FALL IN ALABAMA AND GEORGIA

Small Blizzard Blowing and Increasing in Force in the Central Lake Superior Region.

CHICAGO, Oct. 21.—The tail of a windstorm that centered over the St. Lawrence valley, according to the weather bureau, brought the first snow of the season to Chicago and other middle western points last night. Snow, or a trace of it, was reported at Davenport and Dubuque, Ia.; St. Louis, Mo.; Terra Haute, Ind., and Houghton, Mich. The thermometer registered 35 degrees here, the coldest of the season. Snow fell at Minneapolis.

The cold weather extended south as far as Tennessee and west to Missouri and Texas, according to the weather bureau. Cities in Missouri reported the thermometer at 27 degrees and at Concordia, Kan., it was 24 degrees. Ice formed over the ponds and streams.

A light fall of snow was recorded at Birmingham, Ala., and Atlanta, Ga., and at several points in the Kentucky mountains two inches of snow fell.

Five Deaths Due to Storm. MILWAUKEE, Wis., Oct. 21.—Five deaths, due to the storm which is raging over Wisconsin, were reported tonight. The blizzard is reported the worst for several years, and snow is falling even as far south as Milwaukee. The casualties are:

Two Milwaukee hunters, George McEachron and Thomas Stolt, drowned in Shawano lake at Shawano, Wis., when their skiff was capsized by the gale as they were trying to reach shelter.

Three men were drowned when their naphtha launch capsized in Chequamegon bay at Ashland, while trying to take provisions to a coal steamer in the harbor.

Small Blizzard in Michigan. CALUMET, Mich., Oct. 21.—A heavy snow and windstorm struck the central Lake Superior region yesterday, gathering velocity until a small blizzard was blowing and increasing in force. Marine reports state that but few boats were caught in the storm, most of the shipping being held in harbor.
