TAKE EXCEPTIONS TO REPORT

Union Pacific Officials Vexed at Supreme Court's Proceedings.

ALL READY FOR THE VIADUCT

to Soon as Every Legal Question is Settled Company is Prepared to Start Construction Without Further Delay.

Union Pacific officials take exception to the report of the Nebraska supreme court proceedings in which it was stated that the company had resisted the construction of the Locust street viaduct.

Not Likely to Appeal.

With the decision of the state supreme court against the Missouri Pacific, it is not expected that the company will appeal.

However, with the litigation out of the way, the Missouri Pacific is now preparing to come before the city council with a proposition to change the location of the west approach of the structure.

Superintendent d'Bernardi will contend that by starting the approach north of the point proposed by the city, the necessary elevation will be secured and there will be no grade in getting over the tracks between sixteenth street and fourteenth street.

The Missouri Pacific owns the land north of Nicholas and east of sixteenth street, and in the event the city should agree to let the west approach start from this point, the company would donate the necessary land and waive damages.

The New United States National Bank building to be erected at Sixteenth and Farnam streets is to be no higher than the present building on that site.
