Howell Explains His Scheme.

OMAHA, Nov. 3.-To the Editor of The Bee: In the news columns of your peper, it was recently reported that at the last meeting of the Economic league the proposal to levy a 15 per cent conditional occupation tax upon Omaha's public service corporations, to the end of either compelling a reduction in rates or providing a fund to municipalise the utilities, was declared to be unconstitutional This report was in error, as no such conclusion was announced or reached.

The most important issue before the people of Omaha today is the demand for lower public service rates. This deman is not only insistent, but is gathering force, because of a deep-seated conviction in the minds of the people that the profits of the public service corporations are in excess of what they reasonably should be. It is evident, from the attitude of the public service corporations, that the reductions demanded will not be granted except under compulsion. Three solutions of the problem present themselves: 1. Reduction in rates through



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
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
