

MISS M'HUGH LEADS IN SCHOOL PRIMARY; THOMAS IS SECOND

Omaha Woman Far Ahead in Race for President of State Teachers' Association.

ELECTION BY MAIL TO BE LATER
Committee of Organization Will Canvass Vote in December.

WATERHOUSE HAS MANY VOTES
Fremont Man Has Top Line on Vice Presidential Ticket.

MANY ONE-VOTE CANDIDATES
Miss Belle Ryan Writes Letter to President DeWitt Withdrawing from Contest for the Vice Presidency.

Counting of the ballots in the primary election of the Nebraska State Teachers' association, completed late yesterday evening, put Miss Kate M'Hugh far ahead of the other candidates for president. A. H. Waterhouse of Fremont heads the ticket for vice president, while J. B. Matthews of Grand Island, the present treasurer, has a long lead in the race for treasurer.

The five receiving the highest votes for each office will be placed on the ballot, which will be sent to the members of the association through the mail November 21. The teachers are to vote and mail the ballot back to the executive committee not later than December 8. The committee will then meet December 13 in Lincoln to count the votes and declare an election.

Mistakes in Voting.
There were about 200 candidates for treasurer. Many received but one vote in the primary. There were nearly 100 candidates for president, many receiving but one or two votes. In the voting for executive committee members there seemed to be little conception on the part of many of the teachers as to which congressional district their favorite candidate was a resident, for many names appeared for members of the executive committee who do not live in the district they were expected to represent. These votes necessarily could not count in that district. Also many candidates appeared on the ballots for more than one office. Miss Belle Ryan, shortly after the ballots were counted, wrote a letter to President DeWitt, withdrawing from the race for the vice presidency.

Chancellor Samuel Avery, although he repeatedly begged his friends not to place him in nomination and said he could not accept the office, received a considerable vote. In the presidential race he made third place on the ballot, receiving 555 votes.

Kenyon Not Anxious For Chairmanship

FORT DODGE, Ia., Nov. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—Senator W. E. Kenyon is displeased with the mention of his name for chairmanship of the republican national committee and declares he would refuse without a moment's hesitation. He said today he is helping Senator Clapp prepare a bill to make it a criminal offense for any member of congress to serve on such a committee. Kenyon is home preparing a speech on the reflight bill for delivery at Minneapolis next Tuesday before the Purty congress.

GARMEN'S STRIKE SETTLED

Indianapolis Employes Win Demand for Arbitration.
EACH SIDE CLAIMS VICTORY
Public Utilities Commission to Decide if Corporation and Men Cannot Agree to Terms in Ten Days.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Nov. 8.—For the first time in seven days street cars were running on schedule this morning. Before daylight the first cars left the barns as they did before the strike of the Indianapolis Traction and Terminal company employes.

President Robert I. Todd of the street railway company announced that on some lines it probably would be several days before regular service could be restored, but on the lines where the heaviest traffic is handled, cars would be run regularly.

In charge of the cars were the motormen and conductors who a week ago last night quit their places when the company refused to receive a committee appointed to present grievances. Since then the citizens have walked.

Burglar Lays Out Man Who Beats His Wife

SAN RAFAEL, Cal., Nov. 8.—A chivalrous burglar, who was an unexpected witness to a beating administered by Robert Bernard to his wife, crept from his hiding place beneath the woman's bed last night and beat the husband senseless. Bernard was incensed when he arrived home and found that his wife had calmly slept throughout the looting of her home, but was unaware of the presence of a third party.

Track Graders Ask Four Dollars a Day

VANCOUVER, B. C., Nov. 8.—Seventeen hundred men quit work last night on the Pacific Great Eastern railway grade between Newport and Lillicoet, completely tying up work there. The Industrial Workers of the World, who caused the strike, declare that all railway workmen in British Columbia will go out, for the chief object of the strike is to protest against the sentencing to jail of the Nezalmo miners engaged in the recent riot.

GOVERNOR HONORS THAW REQUISITION

New Hampshire Executive Grants Request of Glynn for Extradition of Fugitive.

CASE GOES TO COURT
Decision on writ of habeas corpus on behalf of Thaw is pending.
AMENDMENT WILL BE FILED
Prisoner's Attorneys Announce What They Will Do.

FELKER EXPLAINS AT LENGTH
Asserts Belief Bill Returned by New York Grand Jury Against White's Slayer Justification for His Action.

CONCORD, N. H., Nov. 8.—Governor Felker today honored the requisition of the state of New York for the extradition of Harry K. Thaw. The case is now transferred automatically to the federal courts, where a writ of habeas corpus on behalf of Thaw is pending.

The governor based his decision on the indictment returned against Thaw in New York county, which charged him with conspiracy to escape from the asylum at Matteawan, N. Y., to which he was committed after his second trial for the killing of Stanford White. Thaw made his sensational flight on August 17 and a few days later was arrested near Centerville, Canada.

Will file Amendment.
Thaw's attorneys announced they would immediately file an amendment to their petition for a writ of habeas corpus, application for which was made soon after Thaw was arrested in this state after his deportation from Canada. The original petition was based on the allegation that Thaw was indicted for conspiracy by the Dutchess county grand jury and it was suspended pending the governor's decision on the question of extradition.

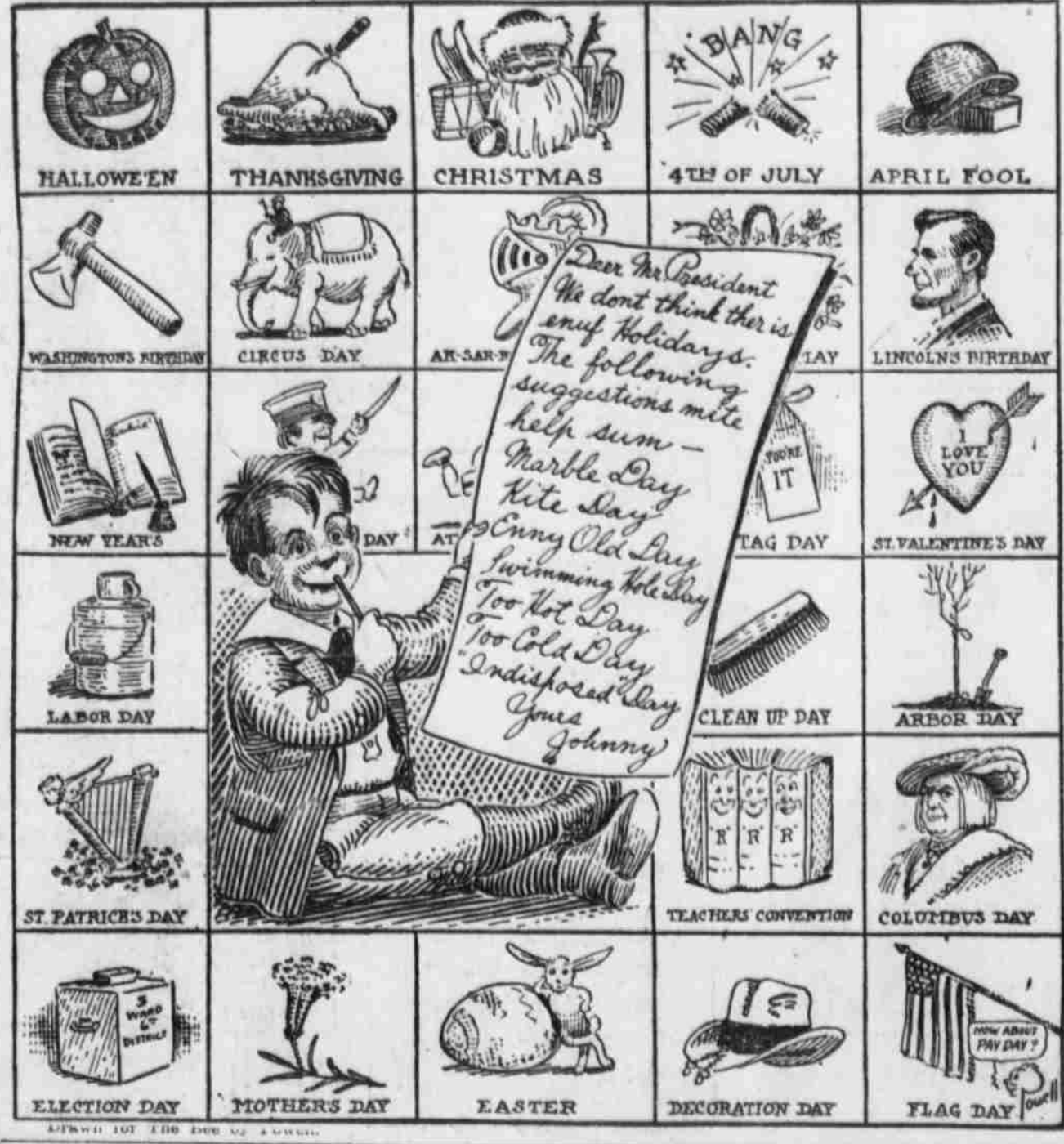
Because the extradition has now been granted on the strength of the indictment it will be necessary to amend the petition accordingly.

Thaw was not present when Governor Felker announced his decision to the attorneys representing the fugitive and the state of New York at the capital. He will remain here in the custody of United States Marshal Nute and Sheriff Drew, pending the federal proceedings.

Rock Island Man Stabbed to Death on His Doorstep

ROCK ISLAND, Ill., Nov. 8.—John B. Schoessel, aged 31, foreman of the machine shops at the Rock Island government arsenal, was murdered on the doorstep of his home in this city last night. He was assaulted by three men at his gate and was stabbed through the heart. His assailants escaped. There is no known motive.

SENATE COMMITTEE DIVIDES EVENLY ON BANK PROPOSALS.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 8.—The deadlock over the administration currency bill in the senate banking committee continued today and the administration supporters by a tie vote, 6 to 6, failed to carry a proposal to increase the number of regional reserve banks.

Liberals Win Seat at Bye Election

LINLITHGOW, Scotland, Nov. 8.—Mr. Pratt, the Liberal candidate for Linlithgow, was successful over his Unionist opponent, James Kidd, but by a greatly reduced majority, at the bye-election held here yesterday. The figures as given out today were: Pratt, Liberal, 1,615; Kidd, Unionist, 1,094; Pratt's majority, 521.

Inspector is Shot by Opium Smuggler

SAN DIEGO, Cal., Nov. 8.—United States Customs Inspector W. B. Evans, was shot and seriously wounded at an early hour today at National City by one of a trio of Mexican smugglers. The shooting occurred when Inspector Evans and his son attempted to arrest three Mexicans suspected of opium smuggling. When called upon to halt by the officers one of the men fired, the bullet taking effect in Evans' shoulder. One was shot in the foot and captured. Seven cans of opium were found in his possession. The other two Mexicans escaped. Evans was brought to a hospital.

ONE DEAD, TWENTY HURT IN TROLLEY WRECK

PITTSBURGH, Pa., Nov. 8.—William Ayres, a motorman, was instantly killed and twenty persons injured this morning when a trolley car on the Verona, Oakland and Hulton Electric railway crashed into the grocery store of Robert Oberwiden at Laketon, Pa. The car ran away on a long hill.

Navajo Indians Are Threatening to Make Trouble

SANTA FE, N. M., Nov. 8.—United States Marshal Hudspeth left this morning for the Ship Rock agency, where an uprising of the Navajo Indians was threatened yesterday. He goes by way of Durango, and when he arrives at Farmington at 1 p. m. Monday, will still have thirty-five miles to ride before reaching the agency.

A special to the New Mexican today from Farmington says that farmers along the San Juan river are prepared to go to Ship Rock in force and heavily armed to protect the agency if the Indians attempt Monday to carry out their threatened massacre.

Vincent Astor and Miss Huntington Will Be Married

NEW YORK, Nov. 8.—Vincent Astor confirmed through his secretary today the announcement that he was engaged to marry Miss Helen Dinmore Huntington, eldest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Robert P. Huntington of Staatsburg, N. Y. The wedding, it is understood, will take place next spring.

Negro is Arrested in Connection With Leegson Murder

CHICAGO, Nov. 8.—Thomas Briscoe, a copper-colored negro, was arrested here today in connection with the murder of Miss Ada C. Leegson a month ago. John J. Halpin, chief of Detectives, announced that Briscoe was identified by a man whose name was withheld, but who, Halpin said, was riding in a buggy on the night of the murder and saw the negro with Miss Leegson.

HADLEY FIRES BOMB IN EVERGLADE CASE

Former Governor Makes Charges Against Department of Justice.
SYLVESTER R. RUSH NAMED
It is Alleged that Prospective Witnesses Favorable to Land Company Are Dismissed by Prosecution.

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 8.—Sensational charges alleging unfairness on the part of representatives of the United States Department of Justice in preparing a case against the Florida Fruit Lands company, pending before the federal grand jury, were contained in a petition filed in the federal district court here today by Herbert S. Hadley, former governor of Missouri, attorney representing agents of the land company.

Railroad Bridges in Colorado Strike Region Are Burned

WATSON, Colo., Nov. 8.—Four or five bridges on the branch of the Denver & Rio Grande between Chucharas Junction and the main line, were discovered on fire early this morning. This branch is the one that brings the output of the House and Lefter mines, better known as the Midway, both properties of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, to the main line. There is a strikers' colony in this neighborhood. The House mine is one of the largest properties of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company in this section and has been operating under guards. With these bridges burned the output cannot be marketed.

King Ludwig III Takes State Oath

MUNICH, Bavaria, Nov. 8.—Ludwig III, the new king of Bavaria, who replaces the mad king, Otto, took the oath of office today in the throne room of the palace with the simple formula prescribed by the Bavarian constitution: "I swear to rule according to the constitution and the imperial laws, so help me God and His Holy Scriptures."

GIRL KILLED BY CAR OF PRUSSIAN PRINCE

POTSDAM, Germany, Nov. 8.—A 4-year-old girl, knocked down by an automobile in which Prince Friedrich Leopold of Prussia was driving near here today, died after the prince had conveyed her to a hospital. The child darted across the street in front of the motor car too late for the driver to avoid her.

HUERTA SUCCEEDS IN BORROWING MONEY IN GREAT BRITAIN

Dictator Raises Sufficient Funds to Run His Government to End of Month.

FINANCIAL OUTLOOK BETTER
Some Banks in Mexico City Resume Silver Payments.

CARRANZA MUCH ENCOURAGED
Rebel Chieftain Hopes for Recognition by United States.

SAYS THIS WOULD END IT
He Can Put Hundred Thousand Men in Field as Soon as Word Comes from Washington—Silence at White House.

MEXICO CITY, Nov. 8.—Provisional President Huerta, it was learned in authoritative circles here today, has secured sufficient British capital to operate the Mexican government at least until the end of the present month.

The funds are said to have been obtained through the efforts of Lord Cowdray, head of the Pearson syndicate. The financial situation here changed slightly for the better today. Some banks are putting out silver.

Among the callers received by John Lind, President Wilson's personal representative, were the bishop of Mexico and General Fernando Gonzales, one of the chief officers in the Mexican army, who recently retired.

Conference in Berlin.
BERLIN, Nov. 8.—The American ambassador, James W. Gilmer, called at the foreign office today and conferred for some time with Dr. Alfred Zimmermann, under secretary of state for foreign affairs.

The ambassador declined to discuss the subject of the conference, but it is generally believed here it related to the Mexican situation. The German foreign office also refrained from comment on the visit of the American ambassador.

It is pointed out here that Germany's sole interest in the Mexican presidential situation is to have an energetic man capable of restoring order at the head of affairs in Mexico.

The report in the American press that Germany was among the powers interested in strengthening General Huerta's position against the policy of the United States is declared here to be untrue.

The cruiser Northa received orders from the Navy department to remain in Central American waters as it might be available to the Mexican coast in case of necessity.

General Carranza Encouraged.
NOGALLES, Sonora, Nov. 8.—General Venustiano Carranza appeared unusually optimistic today regarding the success of the constitutionalist revolution.

Dispatches from his agents at Washington and New York indicated that official Washington wanted to know the exact extent and strength of the insurrection against the Huerta government. This Carranza and his followers interpreted as strong intimation that the Wilson administration was considering recognition of the Mexican insurgents.

Such action the rebel chief considers would insure success of the revolution, and he asserted he could put 100,000 men into the field.

Carranza was cheered greatly today by the news of the successful smuggling over the line at Naco of a large shipment of rifle ammunition.

Dr. Henry Allen Tupper, a field officer of the International Peace forum of which ex-President Taft is an honorary vice president, was in Tucson, Ariz., today on a mission which was said to have some connection with the anticipated investigation by Washington authorities. Dr. Tupper, according to rumor, is an unofficial representative of Secretary Bryan.
