TRIBUTE TO TITANIC VICTIMS

Memorial to-Major Butt and Artist Millet Erected on the White House Grounds.

A small ornamental fountain to consnemorate Maj. Archibald W. Butt, U. S. formerly military aid to President Taft and Frank D., Millet, painter, formerly a member of the commission of fine arts. who lost their lives when the Titunic foundered off the coast of Newfoundland in the spring of 1912, has been erected in he grounds back of the White House. The site chosen for the memorial is a triangle in a small grove of trees, almost directly south of the president's office building, and just outside the driveway

Although of small dimensions, the fountain is of decided artistic merit. It is about tweive feet in height over all, and consists of a low granite pedestal, supporting a bowl of Tennessee marble about eight feet in diameter, from the center of which rises a square shaft also of Tennessee marble. The shaft is of simple classic design and rises about four feet above the level of the water in the basin like a veil.

Around the upper edge of the basin is the following inscription:

"In memory of Francis Davis Millet, 1846-1912, and Archibald Wellingham Butt, 1865-1912, this monument has been eracted by their friends, with the sanction of congress."
