## WOULD BUY THE AUDITORIUM

Real Estate Exchange Favors Making it Municipal Property.

### TO HELP IN MAKING PURCHASE

Committee is Appointed by the Organization to Assist in Securing the Structure for the City.

The Real Estate exchange favors a municipally owned Auditorium, and has appointed a committee consisting of J. W. Robbins, H. F. Wyman and W. T. Graham to confer with other bodies to formulate a plan for procuring the Auditorium for the city. This was done in the adoption of a motion made by W. T. Graham.

C. F. Harrison advised the exchange to go slow, saying that he did not share the apprehension of a number of the members of the exchange that the opportunity of getting this Auditorium might slip away from them if they did not grab it at once. J. W. Robbins and others also said they did not believe there was any great danger of losing the opportunity of getting the Auditorium for the city, but the motion carried and the committee was appointed.

**Myers Addresses Exchange.**  
The newly elected president of the exchange, F. H. Myers, in an address to the exchange reviewed the good work it has done in the past and hoped for great things in the future. He stated that whatever reform might be undertaken in the future would be constructive rather than destructive, as, he said, many of the reform movements were likely to be.

"Just think of the people who have been unable to afford a piano for lack of cash to pay a lump sum of \$300 or \$400," said Mr. Robinson, "but now they only have to pay \$5 cash and the remainder in small weekly payments. And the total price is a reduction of more than 100%."

First steps in the new Orkin Bros. company store will be taken Friday morning when \$50,000 worth of goods from all departments in the store will be transferred to the basement and sold at greatly reduced prices.
