Who Pays Income Tax?

Questions Answered by Ross L. Hammond, Collector Internal Revenue, District of Nebraska
NOTE—These answers are only opinions designed to help tax payers to understand the law, pending rulings by the Treasury Department, which rulings will have the force and effect of law. These rulings cannot be accurately forecast, so these opinions are only tentative.

- Q.—What is the amount of income tax?
A.—One per cent of net income arising or accruing from all sources for the previous calendar year.
- Q.—What is the "normal" tax?
A.—This 1 per cent is the normal tax. It is levied on all the profits of a corporation, joint stock company, association and insurance company; and upon annual income of the individual up to \$20,000.
- Q.—What is the surtax?
A.—It is the additional tax levied on profits and income of individuals of 1 per cent above \$20,000 and less than \$50,000; 2 per cent on the amount above \$50,000 and under \$75,000; 3 per cent on the amount above \$75,000 and less than \$100,000; 4 per cent upon the amount above \$100,000 and less than \$250,000; 5 per cent upon the amount above \$250,000 and under \$500,000, and 6 per cent on all above \$500,000.
- Q.—When must returns be filed?
A.—Between January 1 and March 1.
- Q.—When may the tax be paid?
A.—Any time after the tax is assessed and before July 1.
- Q.—Who must pay the tax?
A.—All corporations organized and conducted for profit; all individuals on their net annual income above \$2,000 and above \$4,000 if married and living as husband and wife.
- Q.—Who must make returns?
A.—Only those as indicated above.
- Q.—May a person have more income than the exemptions and still pay no tax?
A.—Yes. His income may be largely made up of corporation profits and dividends. Then the normal tax having been paid by the corporation, the stockholder may deduct the total of these, so the remainder may be under his personal exemption. But when the total exceeds \$20,000 or the other sums providing for the graded surtax, he must pay this additional tax.
- Q.—Are there any exemptions as income of money received?
A.—Yes. Property or money received by devise, bequest, gift or descent, and of life insurance paid upon the death of the insured, or returned payments of any kind made to the insured during his life.
- Q.—What deductions may be made in ascertaining net income?
A.—All the necessary expenses in carrying on the business, not including indebtedness; all taxes except for local benefits; all losses incurred during the year by trade or accident; debts due, actually ascertained, to be worthless and charged off during the year; a reasonable allowance for depreciation; amount received as dividends from corporations that have paid the tax on their profits.
- Q.—How is income reckoned for this year?
A.—From March 1.
- Q.—What exemptions can be taken for 1913?
A.—Only for ten months, or five-sixths of the year. If unmarried, on \$2,000; if married, on \$2,500.

Farmer's Friends Join in Husking His Corn

FAIRBURY, Neb., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—Because he was confined in a hospital at Omaha and could not husk his corn, thirty farmers living in the vicinity of Endicott, six miles southeast of this city, gathered at the home of John Steinmetz one day this week and participated in an old-fashioned husking bee. Mr. Steinmetz was one of the few lucky farmers in this county to have a corn crop this year. The farmers husked 80 bushels and it was unloaded by a farm elevator owned by W. Hubbard.
A sumptuous dinner was served to the cornhuskers after they had finished the morning's work. The farmers enjoyed games of horseshoes for a while in the afternoon. Mr. Steinmetz is one of the prominent Jefferson county farmers living near Endicott and has been confined in an Omaha hospital for some time.

LOBECK TO PUSH BILL FOR HIGHER PAY SCHEDULE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14.—(Special Telegram.)—Congressman Lobeck today introduced a bill revising the salaries of veterinarians, meat inspectors and inspectors' assistants. The National Association of Animal Industry Employees has endorsed the measure, which provides that the salaries of veterinarians which are now \$1,800, shall be increased \$200 per annum up to \$2,000. Meat inspectors, whose salaries are now \$1,400, shall be increased \$100 per annum up to \$1,500 and inspectors' assistants, whose salaries are 200, shall be increased \$50 per annum up to \$250.
The bill, according to Mr. Lobeck, meets the approval of the South Omaha veterinarians and meat inspectors and he will push it at the coming session of congress with all his might.

CLOSE MINE UNDER CITY

Iowa Inspector Gives Order to Close Workings.
GREAT FEAR OF BLACKDAMP
Johns Mine Pays Royalty to City, but is Dangerous Because of Proximity to Other Abandoned Tunnels.

DES MOINES, Ia., Nov. 15.—(Special Telegram.)—State Mine Inspector Sweeney ordered the Caleb mine in Des Moines closed and dismantled. Fear that a hole will be cut from the mine into some of the abandoned mines nearby, which would endanger the lives of miners, is assigned as the reason for the order.
The Johns' mine is under a park and a royalty for its coal is paid the city. There are numerous other mines near in which have been exhausted and are now either full of water or blackdamp. Should the Johns' mine be dug into one of the abandoned mines it would either be filled with water or the miners would be suffocated with blackdamp.

ENGINEERS WILL OFFER HIGHWAY SHORT COURSE

AMES, Ia., Nov. 15.—(Special.)—The Iowa State Highway Commission today made announcement of perhaps the most important and significant plan it has conceived for the furtherance of the cause of better roads in Iowa—a two weeks' short course at the engineering college at Ames, from December 23 to January 7, for the benefit of every person in the state who is interested in finding out the best methods of the best road engineers in the country. It will be the first of annual "good roads" short courses to be conducted at Ames by the commission.

The purpose of the course is to present in a condensed form and in a short period of time a digest of the fundamentals of the best practices in highway engineering, and all road builders, whether engaged as county engineers or superintendents of highway construction, are urged by the commission to arrange to attend it, the commission believing it to be a valuable aid in the working out of the highway administration system in Iowa.
It is not the intention to turn out efficient highway engineers in eight days, but to offer a convenient opportunity at small expense for engineers now engaged in highway work or allied lines to get a better knowledge of road construction administration methods, say Gay Dodge, an assistant engineer of the commission.

The list of instructors will include specialists in every branch of highway engineering, men who actually have gone out and made the funds at their disposal go farther and purchase more of real value than most men have done who preceded them in the highway field. The lecturers will be state engineers from several states, staff engineers of the Iowa Highway commission, professors of the civil engineering department of Ames, engineers of the national office of public roads at Washington and specialists in highway economics, all of them engineers who not only understand highway engineering in theory, but are thoroughly versed in the practical problems encountered in the field.
