In Omaha there was a fall of about GUS RENZE BANQUETED one-fourth of an Inch during the night. It started shortly before midnight and continued an hour or more, accompanied by thunder, lightning and some wind.

Platte country, extending as far west as McCook, on the Burlington. East of there, and at Arapahee, Red Cloud, Strang, Holdrege and Hastings, the precipitation is said to have been an inch or more. All through the sand hills country of the Burlington and on the branch lines the rain was heavy. Along the Union Pacific the rain was general from North Platte to Omaha and about the same as over Burlington territory.
