Great Difficulty Experienced in Enforcing Quarantine.

ISOLATION HOSPITAL NEEDED

Many Problems Are Met by Officials Who Seek to Compel Persons Suspected of Disease to . . . Conform to Law,

Henry Schmeling, assistant sanitary inspector of the city, is anxious that the city erect a pesthouse for the care of those affected with contagious diseases. The city for some time past has been in danger of an epidemic of scarlet fever and diphtheria. Even with the care bestowed night and day by City Physician Shanaban and City Health Inspector Ed Bursan and his assistant, the situation is still in need of much care. Schmeling says that the spread of the diseases in most cases is due to ignorance on the part of foreigners who do not understand the laws of sanitation or the meaning of the quarantine.

Many welrd experiences have the inspectors accumulated during the last two months in an attempt to enforce the quarantine laws. They have been compelled at times to break down the doors and who would not accept the services of a physician. At other times they have searched through packing houses for men and women who had broken quarantine, even going so far as to use physical strength when everything else failed.

The officers of the health department have had to threaten sometimes with firearms men who refused to obey the orders of the city physician. Schmeling contends that if the city would provide a separata house for the care of such as were affected with contagious diseases the patients could be taken out and segregated without danger to the city at large.
