The bulls in wheat won an uphill fight resterday. The situation early in the cession looked as if the bears might The bulls in wheat won an upbill fight yesterday. The situation early in the session looked as if the bears might possibly regain possession of the market, but there was too much news of a bullish character from various sections of the world to permit the bears winning out. Foreigners were buyers of wheat futures in the Chicago market and their purchases of cash wheat were limited only to the hard winter. Under ordinary circumstances prices would have advanced more than 187%, but the upturn was checked by soiling by longs in order to secure profits. A great deal of the news favorable to the bulls came from Argentine and other countries. France reported damage there by rains and Paris shorts were covering. Disappointing harvest returns were received from Argentine and the weathere there was reported as rainy, and prospects were for a continuation of unfavorable weather.

J. Melady, the Toronto exporter, whe was on the Board of Trade yesterday on his way from western Canada, said that the outward movement of wheat from the farms and country warehouses in the prairie provinces has been large this year, but the railroads were in shape to take care of all the wheat offered and that the weather could not have been improved upon. Also that in his opinion wheat is worth the present price and that while there are some rampant bulls in the country north of us who are talking importing wheat before the crop is ready, there are still enormous quantities of gvain there.

Corn was strong, and while the December was 5% higher the deferred months were unchanged to be higher. Scattered liquidation took the edge off the market on several occasions during the day, but the buying was strong at the close. Continued unsettled weather is expected and the receipts are likely to remain small. A great deal of mouldy and reten corn is in the fields. Farmers are said to be unwilling to sell at present prices.

Cash Loss of Less Than Three Mil-Hon Not So Great as Had Been Expected-Contraction in Actual Loss.

NEW YORK, Dea 6.—There were in dications today of a steady absorption of the high grade stock, such as habeen apparent for sometime past. Of

of the high stade stock, such as has been apparent for sometime past. Offerings at concessions were accepted readily, but no effort was made to force up the list aggressively. It was the same quiet, gradual buying which has held the market steady recently in the face of unfavorable influences. The improved demand recently is taken in some quarters as an indication of larger investment purchasing, such as is always looked for around this time of the year. But has been abnormally small in the last two years.

The only movements of consequence in stocks occurred shortly after the opening. Small declines in some of the favorite shares stimulated buying and the list was quickly placed well above yesterday's close. Then came a recession on which gains were cancelled and the market thereafter barely moved.

Although the poor prospects for the bank statement has aroused some apprehension, the showing proved exceptionally strong. The cash loss of less than \$1,000,000 was smaller than looked for. The most striking change, however, was a contraction in actual loans of \$51,314,000 which showed the extent to which the banks had gone to correct position disclosed last week and fully explained the tightness of the money market this week. Reserve requirements were reduced so sharply that, in spite of the cash loss, last week's deficit was converted into a surplus of \$7,645,000.
