# National League Pitchers' Records

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 .- Following are the official roords of National league pitchers who participated in fifteen or nes during the season of 1912. In computing this record all runs scored were charged against the pitcher except those resulting from fielding errors and passed balls. No runs were charged that scored after chances had been offered fielders to retire the side. The percentage is based on the least number of carned runs per nine-inning game. To arrive at this percentage the total earned runs were divided by the number of innings pitched; then multiplied by nine to find the pitcher's average effectiveness for a complete game
