

Nebraska Farmers' Congress Gives Its Views in Resolutions

The following resolutions were unanimously adopted by the Nebraska Farmers' congress at the meeting in Omaha Friday afternoon:

Rural Credits.
We note the recommendation of the president of the United States that congress speedily pass such legislation as shall provide an adequate system of credit for the farmer to be commensurate with his resources and operate for the reduction of interest rates to a level with those given to other business enterprises.

While this congress commends the patriotic recommendation of the president, we believe that the farmers of the country are not yet sufficiently informed on this subject, nor sufficiently represented at Washington to bring to the attention of congress the information and influence which is being exerted by the powerful banking interests toward similar ends.

We believe that the subject of rural credits has its proper foundation in the local community, and that it is a legitimate subject of state rather than of federal legislation, until it has been developed satisfactorily in its preliminary stages.

We therefore express our conviction that federal legislation upon this subject at this time is untimely and may possibly operate to defeat the ends it is designed to serve, and we call upon our representatives in the senate and house of representatives to proceed with due caution and decline to act upon such measures as are or may be proposed until they shall have been submitted to representative farmers' organizations for their approval or rejection.

Economy in State Government.
We believe that the taxpayers of Nebraska are unnecessarily burdened with a multiplication of boards, commissions and useless employees, which hamper efficiency and extravagantly increase the expense of state government. This congress calls upon the State Board of Control to recommend to the coming session of the legislature such measures as will tend toward the elimination of useless officeholders and the promotion of economy and efficiency in the administration of public affairs.

Rural High Schools.
Whereas, There is a general feeling that the present system of public schools is not meeting the needs of the rural community, and that in order to give our rural youth a high school education under the present system the joy and comfort of home and the community life of the rural people are more or less impaired, therefore, be it

Resolved, That we favor keeping our boys and girls at home in a pure and wholesome environment until they shall have completed the common and high school courses; that we favor a more practical education that will fit them for greater usefulness in life; that to meet these conditions in a satisfactory manner we favor the rural high school, located at a central point in the two or more districts forming the high school union; that the rural high school may teach either two or more of the high

school grades and that we favor the elimination of non-essential subjects in our courses of study and the substitution of those more practical and useful; that we favor securing not less than a five-acre plot of ground in connection with the rural high school for buildings and demonstrations.

Resolved, That the president of this congress appoint a permanent commission of one at large and one from each of the six congressional districts of the state with general powers to advise and co-operate with the commission appointed by the governor of Nebraska to suggest revision of the school laws.

University Consolidation.
Whereas, The individual voter has little opportunity to study for himself at first hand the issues involved in the proposed removal of the state university, therefore, be it

Resolved, That this congress would welcome the advice of a commission of representatives of state universities and agricultural colleges to investigate and report upon the educational, social, moral and economic advantages or disadvantages of consolidating all the colleges of the state university on the state farm campus.

Resolved, That the congress commends the wisdom of the legislature of Nebraska in making a levy for state university grounds and buildings.

Reorganizing Agricultural Board.
Whereas, The question "Should the State Board of Agriculture be Reorganized," has been presented to this congress, therefore

Be it Resolved, That this congress requests the Nebraska State Board of Agriculture, the State Horticultural Society, the Nebraska Improved Live Stock Breeders' association and each of the auxiliary associations incorporated under the Nebraska Improved Live Stock Breeders' association to each appoint a representative, who with a like representative from this congress shall constitute a committee to consider whether through reorganization of the State Board of Agriculture it may better serve the agricultural interests of the state. The findings of this joint committee to be reported back to their respective organizations, together with proposed changes, and recommendations as to the manner in which the changes may be effected.

Torrens Title Registration.
We favor the adoption of the Torrens system of registering title to real estate, under which the state guarantees the validity of titles so registered.

Tax Amendment.
We favor the adoption of the pending amendment to the constitution of Nebraska giving to the people the power to make laws providing for uniform and progressive taxation.

Co-operative Organizations.
Whereas, There is a law upon the statute books of Nebraska providing for the incorporation of co-operative associations with small shares of stock, and

Whereas, The attorney general of Nebraska has recently decided that no association can be incorporated with less than 100 shares; therefore,

Be it Resolved, That the laws of Ne-

braska should be so amended as to make it lawful to incorporate co-operative associations with shares of par value less than 100 each.

Acknowledging Courtesies.
The thanks of this congress are due and hereby most heartily extended to the Commercial club, the business interests and the people of Omaha for the cordial reception they have given us, the assembled representatives of the 100,000 farmers of the state, as well as for substantial assistance rendered in making the arrangements for this session.

We take a just pride in the city of Omaha, the great and rapidly growing metropolitan city of our state, and we believe that the most cordial co-operation between the business interests of Omaha and the farmers of the state will continue to be greatly to the advantage of both.

coin and J. D. Hiem of Broken Bow were chosen as the delegates. The report of the legislative committee, adopted during the morning session, deplored the activity of the bankers in the rural credits question and conferred power on the legislative committee to investigate any proposed legislation upon the subject of rural credits, to report back to the congress, and then to voice the approval or dissent of the congress with reference to such measures.

The clause concerning the activity of the bankers reads: "The extraordinary activity of the American Bankers' association and prominent capitalists, who have hitherto been exploiting the farmer for their personal profit, in this matter of rural credit legislation, augurs ill for the real benefit to the farmer through any measure which may pass congress, unless it shall have first received the careful scrutiny of competent representatives of this and similar bodies." During the afternoon the subject of taxation was discussed. The state tax commission met with the congress for the purpose of hearing the subject of taxation discussed from the standpoint of the farmer.

O'Dell on Taxing Real Estate.
Single tax was denounced by Deputy County Assessor Lewis of Douglas county, who held that it was a move of the manufacturers and business men to take taxes off big buildings and manufactured goods and place them all upon the farmer.

Frank G. O'Dell answered by suggesting that if Lewis and others of the board of assessors would tax the real estate in Omaha at its actual, instead of at 25 per cent of its value, the revenue would be so great from that source that the little revenue collected from a tax on the buildings and the manufactured goods would sink into insignificance.
