Whether or not the lengs in corn will be enabled to hold their position is a question that may be heard on all sides. Those who doubt the stability of the build side of corn at present have in mind the lack of demand for the cash article, as well as the fact that the trade is backing away from the actual corn because the east is taking only a little here and there. The sales of cash corn here yesterday amounted to 65,000 bu, which may be considered quite small under present conditions. One of the best posted man in the Chicago trade said last night that he believed considerable corn is going into the importing countries from America, as the offerings here will doubtless increase and outlet must be secured.

There are many in the corn trade who eay that the country is still long a good line of that cereal and that while some of them have been forced out of their holdings there are many others who have put in stop-loss orders and that they may be forced out before another week rolls around, unless bad weather should develop, and in addition to this an improvement in the demand for the cash article must be seen.

Those who know farmers best are aware of the fact that they seldom dispose of any commodity around the best prices, as they generally get left by holding for higher and still higher values.

The Chicago wheat market closed at advances of Misse, and this strength came largely from the advance at Winnipeg, where Chicago concerns led in the buying. The upturn in the Canadian market was a reflection of the general belief that the wheat in that country is to be admitted to the United States free of duty, and that they will absorb a good portion of the surplus now being carried there.
