

In a few minutes the panic was stopped by the fact that the stairway and the other avenues of egress were blocked so effectually that those inside could not get out and those without could not get in to aid the maimed and remove the dead.

The alarm was spread outside the hall by a few persons who had been near the tioor and escaped unburt. A crowd soon assembled and the work of clearing the hall was begun.

Corpaes Piled Up. The only regular exit was a narrow stairway at the back of the hall. When this had been cleared of the bodies that filled it to the top and a duick accounting had been made, it was found that seventy-four corpses had been piled up beside the hall building. It was thought
