DISAPPEARED DURING JULY  
Friends There Lost Sight of Her and Every Effort Made Since to Locate Her Has Proven Fruitless.

Margaret Willer, pretty 12-year-old girl, who has not been in the United States long enough to speak the English language freely, has disappeared and it is feared that her fate is sad and one. Juvenile authorities, the girl's parents in Germany and her uncle, Timin of the vicinity of Elkhorn, are concerned in a search which has lasted since last July. The girl has borne a good reputation and when she came to Omaha a year and one-half ago juvenile officers took charge of her only for the reason that she was friendless in this city. Last summer she was employed at a home on Dodge street and the boulevard, but left and secured a new place without notifying her friends. She disappeared and there is no clue to her whereabouts. If anyone has knowledge of her whereabouts I hope he will communicate with this office.
