

Nebraska PARENT'S RIGHT IS UPHELD

Supreme Court Says May Choose Course of Study in Reason.

DOMESTIC SCIENCE ON GRILL

Tribunal Holds It May Not Be Forced Upon Student Against the Will of the Family.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Jan. 7.—(Special.)—The right of parents to select the courses of study a student may take in school is upheld by an opinion of the supreme court in a case brought in Lancaster county by C. S. Kelley, to compel Superintendent Hunter of the Lincoln High school to reinstate his daughter, Eunice Kelley, who had been suspended because of her refusal to take domestic science, her refusal to take domestic science, Judge Letton, while concurring in the opinion, says that domestic science and manual training are very essential parts of education and should be given due consideration, but as they are not required in the granting of a certificate it is not within the province of a superintendent of schools to suspend a pupil for refusal to take either. The syllabus of the court sets out:

The right of a parent to make a reasonable selection from the prescribed course of studies which shall be carried by his child in the free public schools of the state is not limited to any particular grade in any particular school. The public schools of the state are entitled to the earnest and conscientious attention of every citizen. To that end the school authorities should be upheld in the control and regulation of their school system; but their power and authority should not be held to be unlimited. They are required to exercise their authority over, and their desire to further the best interests of their scholars, with a due regard to the natural and legal rights of the parents of such children. And when a parent makes a reasonable selection from the course of studies which has been prescribed by the school authorities, and requests that his child be excused from taking the same, the request should be granted, if the request be denied and the child is expelled or suspended for a refusal to continue such studies, mandamus will lie to compel reinstatement.

Sarpy Case Reversed. The levy of taxes by Sarpy county upon personal property of the Hydraulic Press Brick company, which has its clay beds and yards in that county and which maintains headquarters in Douglas county, is held illegal by the supreme court. The decision is a double-barreled one and in reversing the court in its ruling that Sarpy county could levy taxes upon property of the company in Douglas county also reverses the decision of the

Nebraska court which held that Douglas county could not levy on the personal property of the company in the latter county. The syllabus reads:

Where a foreign corporation had its principal place of business in the city of Omaha, in the county of Douglas, but its clay beds and a brickyard in the county of Sarpy, where it was engaged in the manufacture of brick, and the county of Sarpy levied a tax against the personal property of the corporation in Douglas county for the year 1910 which was paid by the corporation for the year 1910, and the county of Douglas also levied a tax against the same property for the same year which was paid by the corporation, it is held that the levy of the tax by Sarpy county upon personal property in Douglas county was illegal.

JUDGMENT SET ASIDE

Judgment of the district court of Douglas county secured by Anna Schmidt against the Williamsburg City Fire Insurance company, in the sum of \$44.28, for insurance carried on a rooming house in South Omaha partially destroyed by fire while unoccupied, was reversed by the supreme court on the grounds that the insurance company had not been notified of the vacation of the property.

Receding Contract

One who seeks to rescind a contract must rescind the whole contract, according to an opinion of the supreme court in a case brought in the Valley county district court by John S. and August K. Collison, against John L. Ream, to compel the latter to return to them thirty-three shares of stock in a flouring mill, owned by them at Ord and which had been assigned to Ream with a like amount to another person named Wright, in exchange for stock in a washing machine company, owned by Ream & Wright. At the time of the transfer, Wright, who was a practical miller, took charge of the Ord mill and made it a success and no action is taken to recover the mill transferred to Wright. The plaintiff set out that the washing machine company was in debt and the stock valueless, therefore they ask for the return of Ream's stock in the mill. The district court of Valley county held in favor of the former owners of the mill, but the supreme court reverses the judgment on the ground that the contract if rescinded at all it must be as a whole.

DIFFICULT TO SECURE JURY IN FLEGE CASE

PENDER, Neb., Jan. 7.—(Special Telegram.)—The Flege trial is progressing slowly. Court adjourned in mid-afternoon on account of having no more talesmen. The regular panel of twenty talesmen and thirty others has been examined. The state still has six challenges and the defense two. The defense accepted the jury two different times this forenoon, but the state was not satisfied. Examination of talesmen will be resumed tomorrow morning.

Fame of Lincoln Shaft.

A letter received by F. M. Hall of the Abraham Lincoln monument committee has been referred to Secretary of State Wait, asking that the Chicago Art Institute be allowed to sell postal cards and pictures of the Lincoln monument on the state house grounds in Lincoln. The inquiry comes from William M. R. French of the institute, a brother of Sculptor French, who made the monument and a model of which stands at the head of the stairway in the Art Institute in Chicago. Mr. Wait has written them that they may sell the pictures if Nebraska and Lincoln are given credit for the monument.

Stone's Work Comes High.

Insurance Case Is Set for April

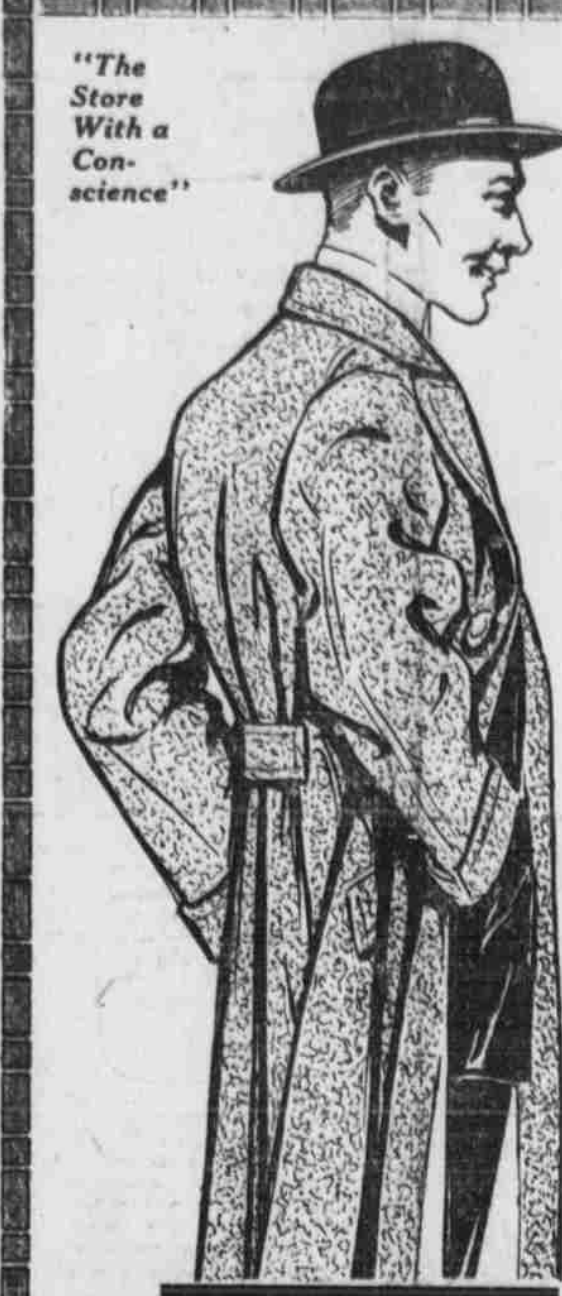
