MANY EXCUSED FROM JURY

McDonald Says Business Men Generally Seek Some Excuse.

MEN WANTED KEEP FROM IT

Attorneys Who Prosecute Damage Suits Do Not Care to Have Responsible Business Men on the Jury.

That statements that the county commissioners do not put businessmen on the jury lists are incorrect," said Henry S. McDonald, chairman of the county board, "is shown by a partial list which I have had prepared of jurors, who have been excused from service during 1913."

"This list contains about 400 names of the most responsible men in Douglas county. It is only a partial list, because it contains only the names of men who are still named in the city directory at the same addresses where they were found by jury summons, and many farmers, who were excused, are omitted. It is complete enough, however, to show what is going on—that the men whom we are most anxious to secure for jury service are refusing to serve."

It is said that on account of the many large verdicts, which were returned in cases in district court in 1913, many defendants who are known to be wealthy are settling suits before they come to trial. Public service corporations are said to be especially affected by this tendency.

Lawyers are divided in their opinions as to who are desirable jurors. Attorneys who prosecute damage suits prefer jurors who are likely to give large verdicts, while those who defend are partial to men of means on the ground that the latter are less inclined to be influenced by their sympathies in determining monetary damages.
