Rules of Contest.

 5—Cash checks must be deposited at or mailed to "Panama Contest Editor" The Bee not later than thirty days from date of payment of same and receipts will be issued for them.

Vote Limit Raised for Bank Deposits

Hereafter contestants in the Panama contest will receive the full number of votes for any amount deposited in the savings department of the Merchants National Bank to open a new account which is bona fide and which is allowed to remain on deposit at least sixty days. This raises the limit which has heretofore existed allowing but 10,000 votes as a maximum for any one account. For the protection of contestants the limit will be again put in force sixty days before the close of the contest.

Exposition Notes.
 Captain John Hance, known to every visitor to the Grand Canyon of Arizona, will be seated on the rim of the concession that name at the Panama-Pacific International exposition every day during 1915. Captain Hance was the first white settler in the region of the canyon and has lived there continuously for thirty years. He has acted as a guide to Grand Duke Alexis, Colonel Roosevelt and scores of celebrities.
 Among the great conventions and congresses to be held in San Francisco in 1915 are national and international organizations devoted to civic, religious, social service, educational, fraternal, business, labor, commercial, agricultural, horticultural, live stock and other activities. Thousands of experts whose distinguished services are devoted to the progress and welfare of humanity will gather at these congresses and conventions.
 Sixteen foreign nations, Russia, England, Germany, France, Italy, Belgium, Denmark, Holland, Spain, Portugal, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Austria-Hungary and Australia, have tentatively accepted an invitation to send troops to an international encampment at the Panama-Pacific international exposition in 1915. A military tournament, in which soldiers of these nations will vie with the boys of Lincoln, is being arranged by the War department.

A standard gauge railroad, with all modern appointments, which has been built by the Panama-Pacific International exposition through its grounds, will provide exhibitors with the quickest and most effective traffic service ever given at an exposition. The cars carry their loads direct to the doors of the various exhibit palaces and in some instances into the buildings. Twelve miles of track is laid, reaching to all quarters of the exposition grounds.
 A reproduction of the Yellowstone National park will be one of the features of the concession district at the Panama-Pacific International exposition. A standard gauge railroad will run through the concession, taking visitors seemingly through the entire park. In the center of the concession reproductions of the geysers and springs which have made the Yellowstone the wonder of the world will be set upon a great revolving platform. The cost of the concession is estimated at \$20,000 and it will be one of the most complete of its kind ever built.
 Frederic Thompson, producer of the Toyland Grown Up concession at the Panama-Pacific International exposition, tried scores of engineers of world-wide fame in an effort to find one who could work out a design for a mechanical man sixty feet high. All failed. Thompson, in a whimsical mood, told his idea to his 12-year-old office boy and ordered the lad—in just to go home and make a working model. The boy, believing Thompson was in earnest, got busy, and his model was so successful that the sixty-foot man will be made from the lad's original drawing.
 The thousands of great trees which are being brought from every country in the world to be transplanted at the Panama-Pacific international exposition are scientifically treated by experts to prevent their dying. The side roots are first cut and sideboards placed down the cuts. Six months later, when the trees have become

accustomed to receiving nourishment only from its bottom roots, these are cut and a bottom board attached to the side one, making a great box. The tree is then hoisted by derrick and shipped by land to sea to San Francisco where it is replanted in special soil brought from the Sacramento river, seventy miles away.
 More than 25,000 cubic yards of rich soil was coveyed from Collierville, on the Sacramento river, to the site of the Panama-Pacific international exposition at San Francisco to be used in the tropical garden which will form the setting for the great exhibit palaces. This loam, heaped up, would make a mountain one-half mile high and 100 feet square at the top and base.

All Nations Will Exhibit at the Big Panama Expo

With the beginning of the year 1914, San Francisco is fully alive to the responsibilities and the opportunities imposed and offered by the approaching Panama-Pacific international exposition, and the tremendous work already accomplished is an earnest of the complete realization of the original plans. Indeed, those closest to it have been nearly the last to realize the magnitude of their own undertaking. But now, with its exhibit palaces rising in their Travertine marble beauty over the 622 acres of exposition domain; with the completion of the wharfage where will dock the ships of the world; with the finishing of the ferry slips adjacent to the grounds for the accommodation of the transbay traffic; with the vast amusement concessions in the sixty-five acres to be devoted to them rising in their novel splendor; with the visions of the landscape gardeners springing into green and color—in short, with all the physical evidence of a superb consummation assuming shape, the promise of President C. C. Moore, made more than a year ago, that "we shall be ready," has assumed the dignity of prophecy to be fulfilled immutably.

In the division of exhibits, directed by Captain Asher Carter Baker, U. S. A., there is promised from every nation in the world a display of intrinsic value, diversified interest and educational importance never before assembled in one city in the history of civilization.

By a special system of rotation originated by John McLaren, superintendent of San Francisco's parks, every flower of the million plants of the tropical garden at the Panama-Pacific international exposition will be in full bloom during the ten months the exposition will be open to the public. A duplicate of every plant will be kept in the nurseries, green houses and lath-houses and as one in the open ceases to bloom a forced plant will be substituted for it.
